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Black Market Operations

Lead Japanese to Court

TOKYO, Oct. 13—(AP)—Sky-

rocketing black markets have

pushed the price of staple foods

up to as much as 80 times the

fixed rate in Japan's urban areas,

the Domei news agency reported

today.

Many dealers on the black mar-

ket have been arrested after

charging as much as \$8 for less

than two quarts of rice and other

foodstuffs in proportion.

Domei reported that several

hundred Army and Navy person-

nel, including some high-ranking

officers, were being tried before

court martial boards now for

black market operations after

surrender.
