90 Pct. of Returned Vets Employable, Kennerly Reports

Ninety per cent of the returning wartime disabled are employable, Orville A. Kennerly, Jr., national service officer candidate for Disabled American Veterans, said today.

"Service disabled veterans," Kennerly said, "constitute about 10 per cent of the total of all veterans, according to the DAV national service bureau in Washington, D. C. Inasmuch as the government provides compensation for total disability for only about 10 per cent of the total number of all service-connected disabled veterans, it must be assumed that the other 90 per cent of them, who are only partially disabled, are employable."

Kennerly pointed out that "properly placed disabled veterans are, generally speaking, less likely to become injured than other employees. They lose less time by reason of illness, are more steady, reliable, cooperative and productive than many able-bodied employees."

Properly placed handicapped veterans, he continued, are just as serviceable and just as productive as able-bodied persons in similar jobs.

"Useful employment helps to build up and maintain the morale of service-disabled veterans," Kennerly said. "Self-sustaining employment causes service-disabled veterans to be less interested in obtaining and pension payments. If all disabled veterans were gainfully employed, the potential expenses of the Veterans Administration would thereby be greatly reduced."

Price Tops Boosted on Sales to Government

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—The OPA yesterday authorized Washington, Oregon and California processors of packed fruits, berries and vegetables to increase price ceilings on sales to government agencies to compensate for higher wage rates.

In Washington and Oregon the increases range from three-tenths of one per cent for fruit and berry juices and nectars to eight-tenths of one per cent for applesauce. For processed vegetables, the range is from three-tenths of one per cent for peas to nine-tenths of one per cent for beans.

Puerto Rico's Choice of Rule Sought by Truman

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—President Truman recommended to Congress today that it take steps to ascertain whether the people of Puerto Rico desire full independence.

In a message to Congress he proposed legislation giving Puerto Rico the choice of: 1—The election of their own governor with a wider measure of local government; 2—statehood; 3—complete independence; 4—a dominion form of government.

At the same time, the president declared Congress should not submit any proposals to the Puerto Ricans which it is not prepared to enact finally into law.
