Conn Balks at Barrier

In Plan to Fight Louis

NEW YORK, Oct. 18. (AP)—Billy Conn, outstanding challenger for Joe Louis' heavyweight title, today refused to sign a contract for a bout with Louis next June.

Conn and his manager, Johnny Ray, objected to a clause in the contract stipulating that Conn could not engage in tuncup bouts or exhibitions without the permission of the promoter.

Merger of U. S. Military Branches Urged by Patterson

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17. (AP)—Secretary of War Patterson today advocated merger of the War and Navy departments into a single agency as a step toward maintaining world peace.

Urging prompt action on the controversial plan, he told the Senate Military committee the subordinate branches should be ground, sea and air.

The secretary was the first witness before the committee as it began hearings on various merger proposals. Navy department officials are expected to oppose all such suggestions.

Patterson said that the atomic bomb and other lessons from World War 2 all pointed in the direction of unified control of the "nation's land, sea and air forces."

Such control was exercised, he said, through the wartime joint chiefs of staff after "we learned from the hard experience" of divided control.

The secretary said that the single, unified control system actually had operated in the field under various theater commanders. He listed Generals MacArthur and Eisenhower and Admiral Nimitz as "supreme commanders" on the war fronts but noted that here in "Washington there was no single military command."

The formation of postwar military policy appeared to be shaping up as one of the biggest and toughest jobs confronting Congress.

Fire Hunting

EVANSTON, Ill., Oct. 18. (AP)—Evanston firemen had to haul 15 tons of coal from a basement of an apartment building to the street before they could extinguish a small fire.

The blaze was in the middle and at the bottom of a bin filled with more than 60 tons of coal and before the firemen could reach it, they had to move 15 tons. Only a few squirts of water were necessary to douse the fire.

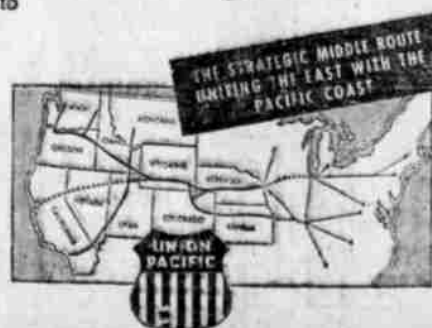

Food Outlook for World, Except as To America, Dark

The world food situation is in sharp contrast to the improved eating prospects of U. S. civilians. The USDA reports an increasingly grave world food situation for 1945-46 with total world farm production about 3 per cent below prewar in terms

of calories and carry-over stocks of major food sharply reduced.

The food outlook is serious in Continental Europe which, exclusive of the Soviet Union, is short 18 million tons of food needed to maintain rations moderately above the wartime levels in liberated countries and to prevent widespread disease and unrest among urban populations in conquered areas. It has shown great declines in production in many other geographic areas with war and drought reducing production about 25 per cent below prewar. The outlook in the Far East is also serious. A large production decrease has occurred in Japan and Japanese-occupied areas. Both China and India face acute shortages of wheat and rice. These needs are in addition to those of the other normally deficit areas such as the United Kingdom.

Better eating, however, is ahead for U. S. civilians due to the sudden end of the war. The Department of Agriculture expects that civilian demand for some foods may taper off this winter as consumer incomes decline, but that general demand

for food will still be high relative to supplies although there may be more potatoes, more eggs, and more of the lower grades of beef available than civilians will demand at present prices.

Food once available for military use will be available for shipment to liberated areas abroad, and will include canned, fresh, and frozen meats; canned fish (cheaper types); canned and powdered milk, eggs, cheese, potatoes, some dry beans and peas, dried fruits, rice, some corn, and wheat. These supplies can be spared for shipment abroad because good supplies of these and other commodities will be available for civilian consumption.
