

Financial Support For Schools Topic Of Huggins' Talk

Representatives from approximately one-half of Douglas county's active school districts attended the meeting at Junior High school in Roseburg Tuesday night to discuss state financial support for the school system.

George Huggins, Coos Bay, temporary president of the Oregon School Boards association, was the speaker, outlining the present inequities of school financing and educational opportunity. He pointed out that while the state legislature is charged by the constitution with providing a "uniform" and general system of education, state support, prior to application of income tax surpluses to offset property taxes was only 1.5 percent. The legislature, he reported, has passed 400 pages of laws governing schools, but still has failed to provide a uniform and general system.

The tax commission, Huggins stated, is beginning to realize that, if uniform education opportunity is to be provided, it will be necessary for the state to provide greater financial support to produce equalization. He reported that the first annual meeting of the newly organized association of school boards will be held in Portland early in December. Boards representing approximately 75 percent of all pupils already have been signed as members and it is hoped to have all boards enrolled in membership and represented at the annual meeting, Huggins stated. The association will consider a proposed constitutional amendment calling for state public school support amounting to 50 per cent of cost, with an equalization clause, so that districts making no assessment would receive no aid, while those with high assessment would receive proportionate aid from the state.

Oregon Harvests Aided Greatly by German POWs

German prisoners of war, assigned to Oregon harvest work when the bottom dropped out of the local farm labor supply following the Japanese surrender, picked well over five million pounds of beans and hops, reports J. R. Beck, state farm labor supervisor in the Oregon State college extension service.

Working in three counties—Marion, Yamhill and Polk—the war prisoners harvested 1,506,400 pounds of green beans. Approximately 3,800,000 pounds of hops, green weight, were picked in Marion, Polk and Linn counties.

Church Preference High At Oregon State College

OREGON STATE COLLEGE: All but approximately 13 per cent of the 3,109 students registered at O.S.C. this term put down some religious preference on their registration slips. This is a higher percentage than usually given this information, which is optional. Presbyterians lead the 33 denominations with 559 followed by Methodists with 528. 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Moneys Allocated for Use of Oregon REAs

Oregon has been allocated \$368,000 for rural electrification loans under the terms of a recent congressional appropriation of \$200,000,000 for such use. Only half of the fund is allocated to states, however. Oregon may also obtain loans from the unallocated half if need is shown, according to word received from the national REA office. Oregon's allocation is relatively small because 80 per cent of Oregon farms are already receiving central station electric service. In the United States as a whole, more than

half of the total farms are still without such service.
