Barroom Brawls in Batavia Make Independence Struggle Look Like Pink Tea Gathering

BATAVIA, Java—(AP)—Nightclubbing in riot-torn Java is like spending a noisy evening in the Lone Star saloon back in Gold-dust days of the American Wild West.

You can expect anything from brass knuckles to Mickey Finn's, and if your only souvenir is a hangover you can figure you came out ahead.

Batavia's nightclub proprietors haven't got around yet to using canal water in their drinks. The most popular concoctions are a skull-cracking brandy that ap-pears to have been distilled from Japanese pine-needle gasoline, and a dubious cocktail mixed with equal parts of cherry flavor-ing, saccharin and some high-voltage ingredient that smells like mothballs soaked in vinegar and coconut juice.

When these two brews are in-discriminately mixed in the stom-achs of Java's cosmopolitan nightclub set, brawls ensue which make the island's daytime strug-gles for independence from Dutch rule look like an ordinary lodge election.

Choice of Half Dozen Wars

There is only one war in the daytime that's more or less be-tween the natives and the Dutch. But at night? You can choose from half a dozen wars among as many nationalists. The wise man plays the role of bystander—but you have to be fast on your feet.

At present only two real night-clubs are open. The third, which catered largely to Japanese sol-diers off duty, had to turn itself into a "day club" to save its re-maining fixtures from demolition.

The remaining nightclubs are at Batavia's most level in quality and stark club level in price. They feature dim, colored lights, tapan orchestras and both white and Eurasian "common" girls hired for their ability to drink customers under the table.

Their clientele consists of for-mer Dutch internees, Eurasians, British soldiers and sailors and American merchant seamen, a few local tired businessmen and

wealthy natives and a number of castaway German submarine crewmen. It is a highly explosive mixture.

Japan Pays for Mistake

One Japanese soldier made the mistake of trying to attend a nightclub with a native girl. Al-though he was wearing civilian clothes, his identity was discov-ered and the mob descended upon him without any reference to his rights under the Potsdam de-claration. He was beaten to the consistency of amber jelly, then picked up spread-eagle and tossed out into the night in the general direction of Tokyo.

Three blond, tough-looking Ger-man submariners at the other nightclub in the same embattled evening got off more easily. They were in shirtsleeves at the bar, drinking alone. When a group of American and English sailors learned they were Nazis they muscled over and invited them to leave. The Germans sneered and started to make an issue of the matter, but after a quick glance at the opposition, Hans, Fritz and Hermann tossed down their drinks and edged out the back door.

With no one else to fight, the American and British exchanged congratulations, and a few drinks later started throwing fists among themselves.

Russian Damsel's Presides

"It's a quiet evening," said the Russian lady bartender who re-fused these encounters to the ex-cess of accompanying medical aid for the victims. She is large of girth and speaks nine languages without, her patrons say, the ability to say "no" in any of them. Because of her nationality

she escaped internment during the war, but got slapped around a few times by the Japanese. She hates the Germans, too, however, and acts as a "finger lady" when-ever a Japanese or German enters.

"Throw them out," she whis-pers, and rubs her fat, diamonded fingers gleefully when the Jap-anease or German goes sailing out to land on his ear on the curb-stone. First, of course, she takes the precaution of collecting for his drinks.

"I could stand Germans—but never Japs—not those monkey men," she says. "They sound like pigs when they eat. They eat soup like this—"(she purses her plump lips and makes a noise like a cow wading across a sticky pasture).

Over in the corner a native piano player tickles out the St. Louis Blues—he gets \$15 a month—and everybody sits back and waits for the next fight.

Major R. D. Bridges of Oakland Freed of Duty

CAMP BEALE, Calif., Oct. 20.—Major R. D. Bridges, Oakland, Oregon, was released from active duty with the Transport com-mand at this separation center recently.
