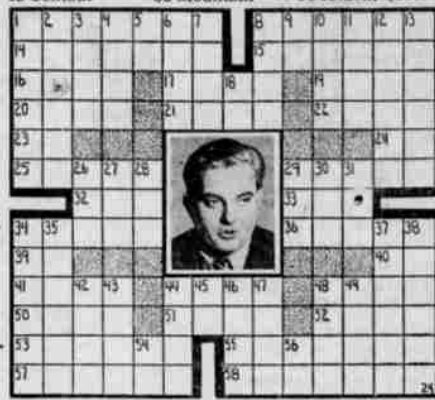

The Boy Scout troop under the leadership of Glenn Warner is planning a hike for Saturday, October 27.

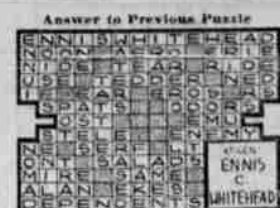
Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Van Horn have returned from a motor trip to Mexico. They visited en route with relatives in California.
