Russia Absorbing Balkan Area Taken Away From Hitler

There's this to be said of Russia, and we shall be smart to note it well: When the Muscovites have determined on a major objective, they drive head-on for it. That characteristic is illustrated in the Soviet action in proposing to conclude unilateral trade pacts with the Axis satellites Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria—a move which Britain and the United States have protested as violating the spirit of the Yalta agreement for concerted policies among the Big Three. The significance of this development seems clear enough.

Moscow has laid out for its

sphere of influence virtually the whole of Eastern and Central Europe up to the line running from the great German port of Stettin on the Baltic right down to the Adriatic. Just take a look at your maps. Within this zone is the new Poland, Czechoslovakia, Austria, Hungary, Finland and the Balkans, with the possible exception of Greece and Turkey, whose status remains to be seen.

The Soviet is determined to consolidate this vast territory. Hitler's System Copied
Now this isn't a new phenomenon. Russia is taking over the Hitlerian sphere of influence. Germany's strength was politico-economic, backed by military power. Moscow's strength lies in similar factors.

Take Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria—these are the countries in the limelight. More than 50 per cent of all their exports were absorbed by Germany. And they had no alternative markets. There's a situation for you—no alternative markets.

The position was crisply summed up for me in Budapest last before the war by a famous Hungarian statesman. After calling attention to the fact that more than half of Hungary's exports went to Germany and that there were no other markets, he added:

"All Hitler would have to do would be to cut off our exports to Germany for six months and we would be bankrupt. Do you think we are going to play along with him? The answer is 'yes.'"

So Russian trade is rushing into the vacuum caused by Germany's disappearance. Time alone will tell whether this new economic set-up will be as effective as the old one. Germany could make it work because of the fact that she was a great industrial nation and could meet the needs of the smaller countries for manufactured goods, while at the same time absorbing their agricultural products. It would seem that Russia will have to balance the economic situation in similar fashion.

Soviet Spy Fools Japanese, Nazis

TOKYO, Oct. 24.—(AP)—A fantastic story of a Russian secret agent who posed as a German newspaperman while directing a spy ring in Japan which reached into the innermost council of the imperial palace and the German embassy was reported by the newspaper Asahi.

The secret agent, Richard Gorge, was arrested Oct. 18, 1941, shortly after he had reported to Moscow that war between Japan and America was inevitable before the end of that year. Asahi said. He eventually was sentenced to death.

Gorge, the paper related, came to Japan in 1933 on orders of the international comintern, although he ostensibly was a special correspondent of the German newspaper, the Frankfurter Zeitung, and a staunch supporter of Hitler.

He subsequently became so highly trusted at the German embassy he was appointed chief of the embassy information section, and much of the Axis and Japanese information, as well as Germany's policy toward Japan passed over his desk.

As a result of Gorge's operations, through sources which were able to reach even into the emperor's palace and report fully the details of conferences with the emperor, as well as meetings of Japan's military leaders, "Japanese secrets at a critical time were leaking through almost completely," Asahi reported.

Arrested with Gorge, Asahi said, were Max Clausen, a German radio technician who transmitted Gorge's information to Russia; Franco de Viekeltich, a Croat, and two Japanese. Their arrests were made after questioning of Tomo Kitabavahi, identified as a former member of the American communist party which had been picked up on suspicion because of his over-zealous sendoffs of Japanese troops en route to China.

Vets Now Apply Direct For Surplus Property

Veterans wanting to buy surplus war property to equip farms now will apply direct to the Portland office of the Smaller War Plants corporation, instead of to their local county AAA office. An amendment to Surplus Property Regulation 7 has eliminated the previously required AAA committee certifications on veterans' applications for agricultural use. Other provisions are unchanged. In that a veteran may buy direct to \$2,500 worth of tractors, trucks, pumps and other articles useful to an agricultural enterprise in which the veteran has a reasonable chance of success.

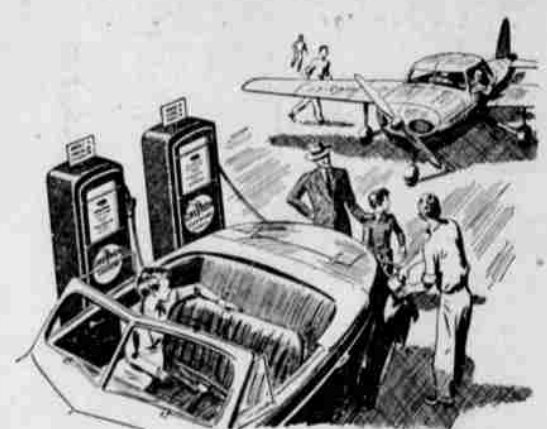

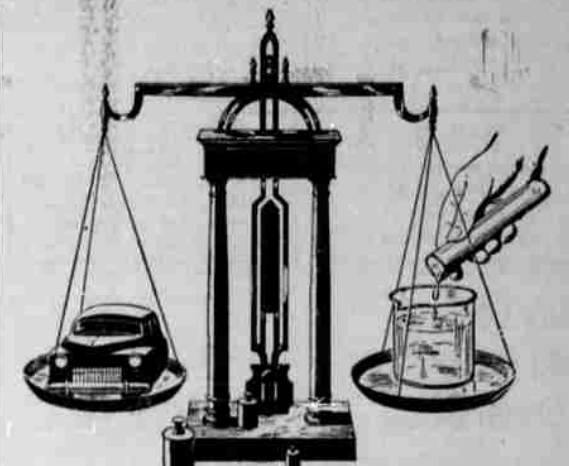
