family, at Monmouth.

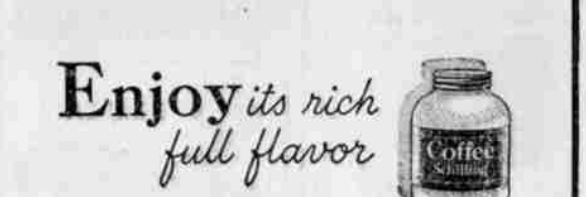
