

Revolts in Java, Indo-China Call For Mediation

It is a pity the United Nations Security organization isn't yet functioning, for it might prevent a catastrophe by friendly intervention in the Japanese rebellion against Dutch rule and the similar revolt against France in neighboring French Indo-China.

Perhaps there still is time, if the organization (which came into real existence yesterday with the ratification of its charter) gets into action soon. That is, there may be time if meanwhile some disinterested mediator can persuade the combatants to declare a truce and maintain the status quo until the United Nations can get to work.

Certainly there's plenty of ground for intervention, since these upheavals already are inflaming other parts of the Orient

and thus are endangering general peace. They can't be considered as local "family affairs."

Britain's General Sir Philip Christison, commander of the allied occupation forces in Java, already has put out feelers with the idea of effecting a compromise between the Dutch and the Japanese nationalists. His position must be difficult, however, because President Soekarno of the so-called "Indonesian Republic" has charged that the British are "supporting and buttressing the Dutch."

However, Soekarno is quoted as saying that "it may assist a peaceful settlement if the United States of America is willing to intervene—the more if Russia and China also took part in this Indonesian problem." Well, the United States government has said that it is ready to mediate if asked to do so. We are waiting for the invitation.

U. S. Labels to Be Removed
More than incidentally, Secretary of State Byrnes yesterday also made it emphatically clear during a press conference that Washington objects to the use of lend-lease arms for political purposes as they have been employed by British and Dutch forces in the Far East. Washington requests the British and Dutch to remove American emblems from lend-lease equipment used against the insurgents, and this brought prompt word from a foreign office spokesman in London that the British commander in Java had been instructed to comply.

The American attitude was further pungently clarified last week when Washington sharply reminded the powers concerned in the Oriental disturbances that they should prepare their peoples for self-government. That certainly is the call of the times, but one wonders how long it will take the world to learn it.

Naval Food Supply Graft Charge to Be Aired Again

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Investigation of alleged irregularities in the handling of naval food supplies at Pearl Harbor was ordered today by the Senate Mead committee.

"It is charged," Chairman Mead said, "that a commanding officer of a sub-depot of the naval ammunition depot, Commander Laurence Blodgett, had received 1,441 pounds of meat and 520 pounds of butter from naval stores and had appropriated them to his personal use."

"Three separate naval investigations, resulted in the latter's acquittal. Admiral Nimitz, commander-in-chief, Pacific fleet, in reviewing this case, severely criticized the way in which the case was investigated and the fact that Commander Blodgett was acquitted in view of the facts developed."

Mrs. Elizabeth Stevenson Of Happy Valley Passes

Mrs. Elizabeth Stevenson, 60, died this morning at her home in Happy Valley. She was born March 2, 1885, in Liverpool, England, and had been a resident of this community for the last 15 years.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Roseburg Funeral home Saturday at 11 A. M. with Father Wm. Blaker officiating. Interment will be in Civil Bend cemetery.

Mrs. R. A. Calhoun Dies At Eugene October 24

REEDSPORT, Oct. 25.—Sadie Orr Dunbar, of the State Tuberculosis society, accompanied by her secretary, visited Reedsport Tuesday and made arrangements with the local American Red Cross organization to handle the details for the visit of the chest x-ray

survey unit in this city Tuesday, November 6. The motor unit will arrive from Florence on the morning of that date and will set up on H street near the Legion hall, which will be used as a dressing station for the subjects, and will operate from 12 noon to 6 P. M. It is expected that more than 400 persons will be photographed during the afternoon.

Phosphate Deliveries Nearing Prewar Level

Phosphate now arriving for fall application brings to 7,960 tons the amount of material received for distribution to Oregon farmers during the 1945 calendar year under the AAA conservation materials program. This is the most phosphate re-

ceived as conservation material since pre-war years.

Provided acceptable fair prices can be established, next year it is expected that growers will obtain their conservation material phosphate from dealers through the purchase order plan, instead of from county agricultural conservation associations. Under this plan, the farmer will

obtain a purchase order in the amount of his expected practice payment for applying the phosphate to soil-conservation crops. He will take the order to a dealer cooperating in the program, take delivery of the phosphate and pay the dealer the difference between the amount of the order and (1) the established fair price in the county, or (2) the dealer's

price if it is less than the fair price.
