Loans on Potato Crops Now Ready Throughout Oregon

Oregon farmers need not sell their 1945 late crop potatoes at less than the announced support prices, as government loans are available to growers through all county AAA committees, reminds R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state committee.

The support prices for Oregon range from \$1.90 a hundred-weight in October to \$2.10 in December in the four eastern counties of Malheur, Baker, Union and Walla, and are 20 cents a hundred higher for all other counties. These are basic prices for U. S. No. 1 potatoes, sacked, f.o.b. cars. The support levels for U. S. Commercial and U. S. No. 2 are 50 per cent of the U. S. No. 1 price.

The closing date for taking out a potato loan is December 15. Full details may be obtained from county AAA committees.

The loan program is the only way the government is carrying out these support pledges on late crop potatoes, the AAA chairman emphasized. Loans are offered on bulk potatoes in either warehouse or farm cellar storage.

Allowances for Error
Loan rates are less than the support prices by amounts reflecting the cost of grading, bagging and other marketing services necessary to prepare field run bulk potatoes for market and load them on cars. Also included are small allowances for error in estimating the amount and grade of potatoes. Producers who deliver their potatoes to the government in satisfaction of the loan, however, receive credit at the full support prices on all potatoes delivered.

All loans mature on April 1, but may be repaid and the potatoes redeemed by producers anytime before that date. After January 1, potatoes may be delivered in satisfaction of loans. Even though loans are repaid, potatoes that once were under loan will continue to receive price support protection, provided producers keep their county AAA committee informed of the number of potatoes still unsold.

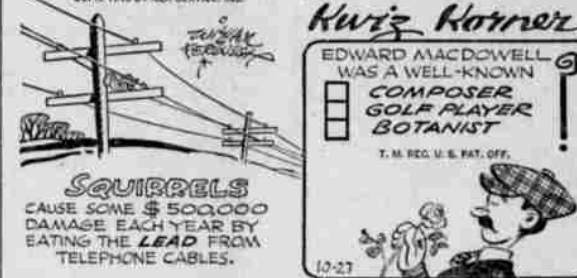

Boy Scout Training Value Praised By U. S. Naval Heads

The value of Boy Scout training to the men of America's navy forces is told in messages received by the Boy Scouts of America in connection with the observance of Navy Day on Saturday.

"The strength of democracy is shown in no better way than in the work of the Boy Scouts of America," James Forrestal, secretary of the navy, says in a statement received by the Oregon Trail council. "The personnel of our Navy consists to a considerable degree of former Scouts. It has been a lesson to the totalitarian states of the world to witness how the Scouts, without regimentation, have organized to aid in the defeat of our enemies. Others Bestow Praise

A statement received by the local council, which serves six counties in western Oregon, from Fleet Admiral Ernest J. King, commander in chief, U. S. fleet and chief of naval operations, says, "The qualities of leadership, patriotism, self-discipline and eagerness to learn which are instilled into every Scout have paid dividends in efficiency in our fleet."

In his statement to the Boy Scouts of America on the one hundred and seventieth anniversary of the establishment of the navy, Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, commander, first fleet and commander in chief, Pacific fleet, says, "In the Pacific ocean area, particularly those who have had the benefit of Boy Scout training in pioneering, field craft, and the lore of living in the outdoors, were better equipped to win out over the enemy and the elements."

Honey Bees Seen Safe From Harm As DDT Applied

Additional evidence that use of DDT at normal strengths in pest control will not cause any serious damage to honey bees is seen in a preliminary report prepared by H. A. Scullen, associate entomologist at the O. S. C. experiment station, on his observations this past season.

Dr. Scullen carried out planned observations on the effect of DDT on honey bees in connection with the extensive tests of this new insecticide for the control of vetch weevil in the Willamette valley. These tests were made jointly by the U. S. bureau of entomology and plant quarantine and the agriculture experiment station. Where DDT was applied to a field, one or more colonies of bees were put in or near the field where their activities could be observed.

New Mark Set in Farm Jobs Supply

Placements of workers in farm jobs by county farm labor offices set another new high mark for the month of September when 33,901 men, women and youth obtained farm work, according to J. R. Beck, state farm labor supervisor at Oregon State college.

An increasing number of year-round farm workers—6,557 in September—were placed, with farm labor assistants reporting greater interest than for several years in non-seasonal farm work. Of the total placements, 17,500 were men, 10,573 youth, and 5,796 women. A total of 260 war veterans were among those helped.

Low Ayres Gets Friendly Welcome On Return to U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Sgt. Low Ayres, former film star shunned by the public when he refused to bear arms as a conscientious objector, is back in his homeland today—a soldier praised by his buddies as "a good guy and a good G.I."

Looking older than his 30 years, Ayres said he was uncertain about his future.

Typical of the change in public feeling toward Ayres was his reception here yesterday when he walked down the gangplank of a transport after 22 months of service in the Southwest Pacific.

It was a friendly and curious crowd that applauded him a little more loudly than it did the other 1,750 Army men who debarked from the ship.

To Continue Pacifist Work
He is not as ready to enter the ministry as reports from overseas had indicated: "I want to do something more directly."

He plans to continue his pacifist work in some way or another: "I want to do something to teach men to understand one another, to love each other as neighbors; I want to do anything I can to help world understanding."

His early views on non-combatancy have been modified, but he never carried a weapon in his three and a half years of Army service.

A certain amount of conscription, he thinks, might not be a bad idea: "the service certainly made all of us more deeply appreciative of one another and reduced our personal selfishness."

Ayres, who won fame as a German private in "All Quiet on the Western Front" and as "Dr. Kilgore" in a later series of films, incurred public disfavor when he listed himself in the early days of the war as a "conchle."

He was sent to a camp at Wyeth, Ore., but later joined the armed forces as a non-combatant. In the months he spent on New Guinea, Leyte and Luzon he served as a medical corpsman and chaplain's assistant.

Isaac Selig Dies At Myrtle Creek

Isaac Selig, 74, life-long resident of Myrtle Creek, died Wednesday. He was born September 29, 1871. He was a member of the Odd Fellows lodge of Myrtle Creek for 38 years.

Surviving are two brothers: Nate Selig, Portland; Isador Selig, Glendale, Calif.; one sister, Mrs. Minnie Moore, Myrtle Creek; and two nieces: Mrs. Otis Clayton and Mrs. Charles DeRoss, both of Roseburg.

Funeral services in charge of the Roseburg funeral home will be held at 2 P. M. Sunday, in the Christian church of Myrtle Creek with Rev. E. W. Powell officiating. Interment will be in the Odd Fellows cemetery of Myrtle Creek.

Japs' Effort To Produce A-Bomb Has Funny Results

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Japan was working on development of an atomic bomb during the war, senators were advised yesterday. The efforts failed because:

1. Japanese physicists reached mistaken conclusions.
2. B-29s demolished the Tokyo laboratory where the experiments were being conducted.

Dr. Karl T. Compton, president of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, told a Senate-Commerce subcommittee about the Japanese activities. He has just returned from Japan where he checked up for the United States government on what Japanese science accomplished during the war.

Asked by Senator Magnuson about reports the Japanese had a "death ray," Compton said they had a magnetic ray which would kill a rabbit at about 30 yards.

"They told us muskrats were much more resistant," he added with a laugh.
Balloons Belittled
The original idea of the ray, he related, was that it could be focused on an airplane engine and by interfering with the ignition system could cause the engine to stop.

"They made it work on a Ford car at 30 to 40 yards if the hood was up," he added. "If the hood was down the metal shielded the engine."

Compton dismissed as intended for "home psychology" the balloons which Japan floated through the stratosphere to this country with small bombs attached. Japan was being bombed and it made the Japanese people feel good to think that bombs also were falling on the United States, he said.

Compton was one of two scientists who testified in opposition to clamping secrecy on atomic energy and nuclear physics. They said such a step would be fatal to this country's national security.
