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ONE MORE ROUND

E. C. (Eddie) Sammons, chairman of the Oregon State War Finance staff, once had ambitions for a newspaper career. He had the good sense to transfer into an activity from which he could accumulate a little money, something few newspaper men have been able to achieve, and now heads the United States National bank in Oregon.

But from his days as a reporter on The Oregonian, Sammons frequently calls up interesting incidents, one of which he is using in promotion of the Victory Loan campaign.

In the period of his newspaper work he was assigned to The Oregonian's sports department and was sent one night to interview "Gentleman Jim" Corbett, then world's heavyweight boxing champion, who appeared with a vaudeville troupe at Portland's old Heilig theater.

In the course of the interview Reporter Sammons asked: "What does it take, Jim, to become a champion?"

The reply was a classic: "The ability to fight one more round."

The Victory Loan campaign, which opened today, is the last of a series of war finance drives. Henceforth the federal government will change the designation from "war" bonds to "savings" bonds. People of the United States will be urged to continue investing their surplus funds in federal securities, and continuation of the payroll plan of savings will be promoted.

This is the last round of the war. The American people have fought on three fronts. Our young men have fought on the battle fronts. Millions have fought on the production front. Third is the financial front, where the battle still is to be waged.

Government war spending did not end with the command to "cease firing." We still have the expense of returning our heroic veterans to their respective homes. We have ceased manufacturing great stores of war equipment and materials, but we have gratefully and gladly authorized financial benefits to veterans at a cost equalling the expense of war production.

The task of getting our veterans home as quickly as possible, assuring them homes, education and jobs, is a responsibility which the nation cannot carelessly toss aside. That's still a part of the war. The "atom bomb" which will assure a smashing victory in that particular phase of the war is our surplus dollars.

We speak of "surplus" dollars, for it would take only 15 per cent of the money now lying in time deposits in Douglas county banks to meet the county's Victory Loan E bond quota of \$375,000. During the year 1944 our savings deposits in Douglas county increased from \$1,941,000 to \$2,545,000. Sixty-two per cent of the amount by which we INCREASED our savings would meet our E bond quota.

There is no question of our ABILITY to "fight one more round"; it simply is a matter of our DETERMINATION—whether we measure up to championship calibre.

Douglas county's quota for the Victory Loan campaign is \$375,000 as compared with \$480,000 asked for the Seventh War Loan. We must not fail hereof; we must not fail this time. But, instead of waiting until the last week to win, let's end the effort quickly. We can win in the first week as easily as in the last if we will all cooperate.

Douglas county started off the series of war bond campaigns as a real champion, but we have shown definite symptoms of tiring. After heading the list in several of the drives, we took a sound beating in the Seventh. We finished in 22nd spot.

Can we make a comeback? Are we still champions? Can we fight one more round?

We have the answer in our pockets!

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Unfaithful Wives British Problem

LONDON, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Parliament pondered today the case of the soldier who comes home from the wars to find his wife in another man's arms, but who must remain married for two years because he cannot afford lawyers to plot his divorce through the courts.

Describing homes broken by war separations, labor member L. Col. O. M. Lipton said he has "known cases where the first indication anything was wrong was when the serviceman contracted venereal disease from his wife on returning to this country."

It's a tribute to the self control of our men that in so few cases, when faced with domestic tragedies of this kind, they had taken the law into their own hands," Lipton said.

The poor persons committee of the law society, which arranges low cost legal service for applicants, has a backlog of 14,000 applications, of which Lipton said more than 12,000 were in the "services divorce department."

U. of O. Hoop Star Fined On Drunk Driving Count

REEDSPORT—Walter Bernard (Wallie) Borrevik, U. of O. basketball star, paid a fine of \$150 in the Reedport Justice court Thursday after pleading guilty to a charge of drunken driving. Judge Fred M. Wright reported, Borrevik was arrested, the judge said, following a collision with a parked car belonging to Joe N. Welter, Portland produce dealer, after Borrevik reportedly had lost control of his car in making a turn on the main street. Borrevik and a woman companion were cut by flying glass. A 30-day jail sentence was suspended, conditional upon future good behavior.

Borrevik's driver's license was revoked for one year. The fire department received a second call Thursday afternoon, when a flue fire occurred at the James Lent home in Wade's Flat district. There was no damage.

U. of O. Freshmen Girls Spend More Than Males

ENGENE, Ore., Oct. 29.—(AP)—Men students at the University of Oregon took note today of a survey of expense budgets of freshmen girls and boys and decided that entertaining "Dutch treat" would save them \$30 a year.

Freshmen girls expect to spend \$650 this year and the boys \$625, but the co-eds noted only \$42 for

entertainment while men expect fun to nick their wallets \$71.50. Other statistics: clothing — women, \$82 in Eugene, \$33 in Portland, men \$56 and \$34; auto upkeep, men \$35, women \$1.50.
