Nuns Describe Hardships

In Hands of Japanese
SEATTLE, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Three
Roman Catholic nuns who were
in a Jap prison camp on the out-
skirts of Nagasaki when the at-
om bomb leveled the city, ar-
rived in Seattle yesterday on a
motorship.

With fifteen other nuns, all re-
patriated war prisoners, the three
described their sufferings and
hardships while in Jap hands.

"There were 28 women in one
room of our house," Sister Sainte
Radeconde told newsmen in de-
scribing their Nagasaki quarters.
"It made things difficult," she
said.

Sister Tonna Joseph showed a
tiny scar on her throat. It was
caused by flying glass when the
atom bomb exploded. She laughed
away the wound. "This is nothing
—just a scratch," she said.

Fire Razes Power Plant,
Darkening Four Towns
GOLD BEACH, Ore., Oct. 29.—
(AP)—Indignant citizens today de-
manded an investigation into why
batteries in the city's two fire
trucks were "dead" Saturday,
leaving the engines unable to
respond to a fire that destroyed
the power plant serving four
coastal towns in this area.

The community was forced to
use lamps, candles and lanterns
Saturday and Sunday nights until
emergency power units could re-
place those of the Gold Beach
cooperative utilities.

Gold Beach, Wedderburn, Ophir
and Squaw Valley were without
lights. Power company manager,
Dick Fish, said he was unable
to estimate when service could
be restored.

SOVIET GRAB FOR
More Power Holds
Third War Threat

(AP) Foreign Affairs Writer
We shall have a fair idea a
year from now whether we are
headed for peace or for another
war—but let no one doubt that
the intervening months are filled
with perils.

Blunt notice of the dangers
was given yesterday in Leeds,
Scotland, by Britain's former
foreign minister, Anthony Eden.
He declared that the terrible
warning of the atomic bomb "has
failed to produce any healthy
consequences," and continued:
"The nations are not joined
closely together. Unhappily, the
tendency is rather in the reverse
direction. The world unquestion-
ably is in very grave danger. We
need cool, calm and understand-
ing leadership."

Bishop Voices Warning
Simultaneously another noted
figure, Bishop G. Bromley Ox-
nam of New York, president of
the Federal Council of the
Churches of Christ in America,
told an Ohio teachers conven-
tion in Cleveland that if the big
nations fall out, the security of
all nations is in jeopardy, and he
added:
"Peace is not being negotiated
with Germany and Japan. They
have been defeated, and await
the kind of peace that the victors
establish. Peace is being nego-
tiated with Great Britain and
with Russia."

"Unity can be maintained
without recourse to appeasement.
Appeasement does not contribute
to peace, but adjustments in
practical affairs mean compromise.
The alternative to some com-
promise solution in Europe is two
great blocks facing each other in
suspicion, each madly arming
with a third world war in the
shadow."

Russia Reaching Out
There are plenty of grounds
for uncomfortable thoughts
which are more than suspicions.
For example, we see Europe be-
ing divided up into spheres of
influence. We see Russia reach-
ing out to gain greater domina-
tion than Hitler ever held. Those
aren't suspicions, but facts.

Where a lot of people go wrong
is in believing that there neces-
sarily must be another war
fought over the Soviet extension
of influence. Acceptance of war
as inevitable is in itself a breeder
of war. Remember that "as he
thinketh in his heart, so is he."

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The first thing we have to

recognize is that, with the dis-
appearance of both Germany and
Italy as great powers, the exten-
sion of Russia's zone of influence
is a logical corollary. It may be
a corollary we dislike intensely,
but it still is logical. Every great
power has its zone of influence,
if you stop and check up.

"If We Don't Lose Heads"
So we don't have to go to war
over zones of influence as thus
far constituted. That doesn't
mean that we have to take any
rough stuff lying down. There
are more ways of dealing with
over-ambition than by using a
gun.

It is with no feeling of undue
optimism that our columnist re-
peats his theme song: "War is
not inevitable." However, we
have grim months ahead—as wit-
ness British Foreign Secretary
Bevin's statement in the House
of Commons yesterday that hun-
ger and privation in Europe may
bring a further, prolific human
loss more devastating than the
gun or atomic bomb. That suffer-
ing is likely to add to the po-
litical difficulties. But we shall
come through all right if we
don't lose our heads.
