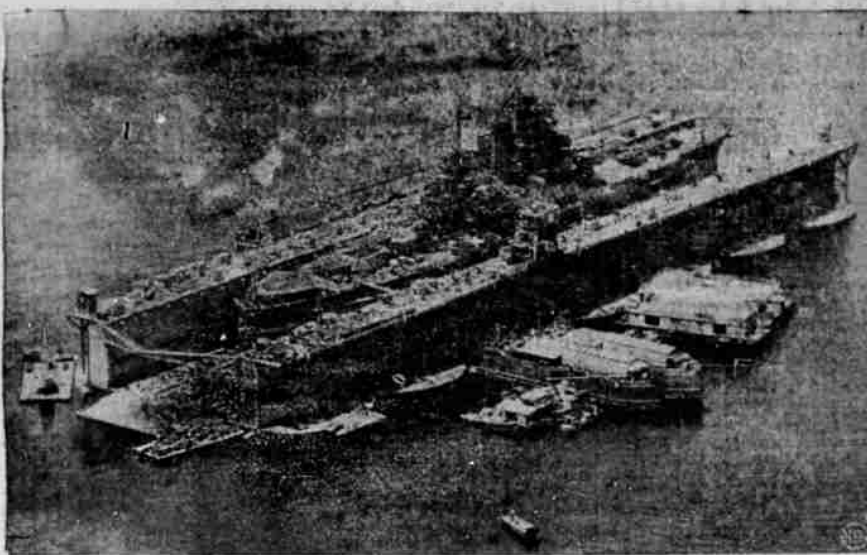

Further Effort to Meet Chest Quota Urged by Ruebel

Early completion of solicitation by workers on the Community Chest drive was urged this morning by Ray Ruebel, general chairman of the campaign. "Some donations are generous," Ruebel said, "and if all would do as well as a large tractor firm which made a \$200 donation, in addition to a minimum of five dollars each from nineteen of their 20 employees, there would be little doubt of achieving our goal. However, we feel that many will need to increase their subscriptions if the work of the Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls, Salvation Army, Community Recreation program, Christmas Cheer of Veterans committee and the Cancer control, in addition to 26 state and national War Chest agencies, is to be maintained."

Fresh Atrocity Proof Introduced In Yamashita Case

MANILA, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Basilio J. Valdes, Philippine chief of staff, today told a military commission trying Japanese Lt. Gen. Yamashita on war crime charges that he found the half-cremated bodies of his older brother and a nephew in a pit filled with decomposing flesh.

Earlier, the general's sister-in-law, Mrs. De Valdes, and Mrs. Justa Guido, described how their husbands—Lt. Col. Alejo Valdes and Jose Guido—were tied up by Japanese soldiers under Yamashita's command and taken away, never to be seen alive again.

Meanwhile, the defense indicated it would seek to prove that those who fought the Japanese after the surrender of General Wainwright could be considered war criminals and that the Japanese occupying Manila found themselves in a situation where any and all civilians might be guerrillas in disguise.

Explaining he did not condone atrocities, Capt. Adolf F. Reel of Boston said the defense would attempt to show that the existence of this underground army without uniforms was reasonable for actions of the Japanese troops under the "Tiger of Malaya." Valdes testified that he and some soldiers "found many bodies piled on top of each other" in a pit under ruins of a paper factory in Manila.

Resumption of Trap Shoots Plan Of Rod-Gun Club

Resumption of public trap shoots will be undertaken by the Roseburg Rod and Gun club, it was announced today by John Amacher, president, following a meeting of the board of directors Monday night. A turkey shoot, open to the public, Nov. 18, will inaugurate the program. Fred Kuck, chairman of the committee, reports that arrangements are being completed for installation of traps on a site donated at Winchester by President Amacher. Trap loads and ammunition have been obtained by the club.

Announcement was made of arrangements for a membership campaign, with a goal of 1,000 members for 1946. Paul Caskey and Mert Krell are to head the two divisions of the club, and the losing team will be required to furnish a dinner for the winners.

Earl Duncan, chairman of the game committee, reported on a wildlife survey which indicates, he states, a decrease in game animals and birds and an increase in predators. The club is considering sponsoring pheasant propagation through 4-H clubs. Fred L. Perry, Burdette Leas, Mel Ingram and Bruce Yeager were named as a committee to cooperate with the high school in setting up a rifle range and organizing boys' and girls' rifle teams.

Duck hunters will not be able to reach the lake over this time during the two-day closure, which has been ordered while a new culvert is installed at Lupine creek. It is expected to have the road in passable condition Friday.

A road crew, under the direction of Ira Poole, is engaged in extensive improvements to the road between the lake and the junction, a distance of about six miles. The roadbed is being graded, widened and surfaced.

The Windigo Pass road, north of Diamond Lake junction has been closed by snow, Churchill reports.

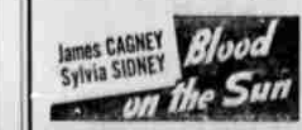

Air Power Tops in Crushing of Nazis

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Twelve civilians declared today that allied air power was the decisive factor in the conquest of Germany.

Victory in the air cost the United States 79,265 flying men and 18,000 planes, the British 79,281 fliers and 22,000 aircraft, the committee said in a report to the War department.

But their air power killed some 300,000 Germans—more than the total of U. S. armed services dead in all theaters—destroyed or heavily damaged 3,600,000 dwellings, made rubble of principal German cities and kept 3,000,000 persons busy repairing bomb damage.

The appraisers were named by former Secretary of War Stimson at the suggestion of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt to make an impartial study of the effects of aerial attack on Germany.

Their conclusion was that Germany lost the war by losing the battle of the skies in the early months of 1944. Thereafter her

resources were exposed to all-out allied air attack.
