IT IS true, unfortunately, that in disturbed times ambitious OUTS will take advantage of this situation to try to get IN.

SPENCER MOOSA, AP correspondent in Chungking, cables: "Reports of heavy fighting between Chinese Communist and central government troops in North China picture a nation LOCKED IN CIVIL WAR, real though not officially declared."

Insistent reports that the Russians are supplying the Chinese Communists with captured Japanese war material continue to circulate in Chungking, but no one in authority will allow himself to be quoted."

SOURCES favoring the Chungking government say they think Chiang would start a smashing campaign against the Communists, hoping to put them out of business in from three to six months, if he were not afraid of the reaction from other governments, particularly the UNITED STATES, and the possibility that Russia might support the Reds.

THESE foreign troubles may bore you. You may be tempted to say: "Let's forget them. Let's leave the rest of the world to stew in its own juice, and get on with our own business."

Such thinking, alas, belongs to the WORLD OF YESTERDAY. Whether we like it or not, we're now a WORLD POWER, with all the responsibilities for world leadership that are involved.

IT is a radically different world, in which we must assume the responsibilities of active leadership or accept the consequences of leadership that may be LESS wise and capable than ours.

OUR own reconversion picture is disturbed, but ought to get better as time passes and tolerance and forbearance take the place of suspicion and selfish motives that now, more or less unavailably, prevail.

WHETHER or not we shall have compulsory military training of our youth in America is still an open question—with the odds at the moment somewhat against it.

An unofficial pool of the Senate indicates that 19 senators are openly against it. Forty more haven't spoken their minds. As yet, opponents haven't offered

THE LEGION SURRENDERS

Umpqua Post of the American Legion is planning a unique campaign to inform returning veterans concerning purposes of the organization and to invite membership. The post plans to complement personal invitation through newspaper and radio advertising, posters and other means of publicity.

The American Legion, as a national organization, in opening its rolls to the predominating number of World War II veterans is, in effect, committing itself to unconditional surrender, but not in the sense with which we usually associate that act.

The American Legion was created to perpetuate the comradeship of veterans of the First World War. As such it was destined to follow into oblivion similar associations formed by veterans of other wars.

Already veterans of the Second World War are assuming command of the American Legion. Nearly every post throughout the nation has younger men in key offices. Soon the veterans of the First World War will have relinquished control and will take back seats while their sons carry on the task to which the American Legion is dedicated.

It is a priceless heritage which the veterans of the First World War pass on to the men of the last war.

The physical assets of this heritage consist of approximately 13,000 posts, \$100 million worth of property in the form of club houses, investment and building funds, trust funds, restricted funds and endowments, together with an established membership of more than 1,600,000 men and women.

The American Legion is more than a quarter of a century old. History of veterans' organizations is that it requires about 15 years to reach an effective position. Thus the American Legion is offering its maturity to the homecoming veteran.

The heritage includes the prestige of the American Legion. The American Legion has had many bitter enemies. It has not always been popular. But, despite criticism, ridicule and vituperation, the American Legion pursued a determined, unwavering program. Today, an apologetic nation admits its error and confirms policies long advocated by the American Legion and kindred organizations.

The American Legion heritage also includes a priceless record of selfless devotion in fields of rehabilitation, child welfare, Americanism, junior education, national defense, etc. Cooperation from the American Legion has been an important factor in developing the Veterans Administration. The American Legion's program for veterans of World War II was enacted into the G. I. Bill of Rights with only few modifications. The organization has been most active in promoting welfare of disabled or needy veterans, their widows, and orphan or dependent children.

Working side-by-side with the American Legion have been the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, and other like groups, which, by nature of their organization are open to membership from veterans of all wars.

It is well, we believe, that upon foundations already laid, veterans of the two world wars have the opportunity to build an edifice of service to their needy comrades and the nation.

We commend the American Legion for its unselfish act of surrender, for we realize it was not an easy decision to make. But having made the decision, the Legion is actively campaigning to join its service with the men who will dominate future policies and carry on established traditions.

Soviet Ignores Bid to Japan Policy Meeting

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—The Allied Advisory Commission on Japan met formally for the first time today and then adjourned for a week—evidently to give Russia another opportunity to join the session.

The man who wasn't there actually dominated the initial meeting. The absentee was a Russian. The Soviet Union simply failed to send a representative in response to an invitation.

Foreign Minister Evatt of Australia served notice that he does not intend for the small nations to be pushed around by the big powers in the commission meeting.

Secretary of State Byrnes opened the meeting with a welcome to the 10 representatives of member nations. Byrnes said he was sure the commission would "function with efficiency" although he described it as an "interesting experiment" because

of the variety of governments involved.
