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**R. H. S. Indians In
Fair Condition to
Battle Ashland**

The Roseburg High school Indians, gradually recovering from the epidemic of colds and influenza, which eliminated all except five regulars from the starting lineup with last week's critical game against Cottage Grove, will have a fairly complete roster for Friday night's game at Ashland, but will not be at full strength, Coach Mel Ingram reported today.

The team will be particularly handicapped by lack of scrimmage practice. Ingram has kept the squad indoors all week, confining practice to signal drill and "skull practice" in the gymnasium to avoid contracting further illness by scrimmage on a wet field.

Harvey will be back in the lineup this week. Sullivan, who has a strained ankle, will be available for only part time. Evans, who lost 20 pounds of weight during his illness, will be used only for short periods, if at all. McCowan and Ulrich will not play. Otherwise the team is expected to be intact.

Ashland Team Strong

The game at Ashland will be played on Phillips field in that city at 8 o'clock.

Ashland has a strong team this year and has piled up 106 points to 26 for their opponents. The line averages 164 pounds in weight and the backfield averages 157 pounds, slightly more than Roseburg's team in both departments.

Ashland defeated Lakeview 45 to 0, Dunsinuir 35 to 0, Grants Pass 19 to 6. The Lithians were beaten 13 to 6 by Marshfield, although statistics show Ashland to have outplayed the two teams by which they were defeated.

**Wage-Price Policy Stated
By President Truman**

pected to affect the bulk of wage earners.

The provision that employers could seek price relief six months after wage increases, Mr. Truman said, "is something which I am sure will help industry get over this very difficult period of readjustment."

He said "industry will not be aided by the government in taking an unreasonable chance in absorbing such wage increases."

"After a reasonable test period which, save in exceptional cases, will be six months, if the



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industry has been unable to produce at a fair profit, the entire wage increase will be taken into account in passing upon applications for price ceiling increases.

War-time Teamwork Needed

The president made these other points:

1. The labor-management conference convening next Monday is to "recommend machinery for mediating or arbitrating differences whenever collective bargaining fails to work."

2. Recent labor difficulties "stand in the way of reconversion" and re-employment of veterans and war workers. "We need more of the good sense, the reasonableness, the consideration for the position of the other fellow, the teamwork which we had during the war."

3. Congress has bottled up liberalized unemployment compensation and "full employment" legislation which Mr. Truman regards as vital.

4. To grant industry price relief to match every wage increase would bring on inflation. "While the positions of different industries vary greatly, there is room in the existing price structure for business as a whole to grant increases in wage rates."

The president made liberal use of a confidential report of reconversion economists which, though not made public, had "leaked" to some Washington newspapermen. He did not, however, mention the report's finding that 24 per cent wage increase could be allowed generally on the basis of measurable business factors.

Deflation Peril Cited

He said the change-over from a 48 to a 40-hour week means a loss of almost one-quarter in the worker's weekly pay. At overtime rates, he got 52 hours' pay for 48 hours of work.

"It has been estimated," Mr. Truman said, "that, unless checked, the annual wage and salary bill in private industry will shrink by over 20 billions of dollars. That is not going to do anybody any good—labor, business, agriculture, or the general public."

"It is a sure road to wide unemployment."

"This is what is known as deflation, and it is just as dangerous as inflation."

However, we must understand that we cannot hope, with a reduced work week, to maintain now the same take-home pay for labor generally that it has had during the war. There will have to be a drop. But the nation cannot afford to have that drop too drastic."

It was this reference which had led some labor leaders, after a White House conference, to believe yesterday he intended to advocate in his speech the granting of 48 hours' pay for 40 hours' work—an increase of 20 per cent. But the president, who revised his address throughout yesterday, did not make this recommendation.

Critics Are Inconsistent

Instead, he said at one point: "Many people have asked the government to step in and decide who is to increase wages and by exactly how much. I have, indeed, been criticized because I have not stepped in to lay down the law to business and labor."

"My refusal to do so has been deliberate. Curiously enough, the same people who urge me to use government wartime machinery of control to determine wage adjustments have on other occasions been the first to point out that the continued intervention of government must spell the

end of our system of free enterprise."

Industry as a whole is able to absorb substantial wage increases without price increases, he said, because:

Elimination of time and a half for overtime has reduced labor costs per hour. Workers are being downgraded in jobs. War-time know-how will increase production. Profits have been and still are "very good indeed." Congress is considering elimination of the excess profits tax.
