unions after members said efforts to settle a wage dispute failed. The union, asking a 25 per cent wage boost, said the company had refused any increase and termed "grossly unfair" a War Labor board order for a flat five-cents-an-hour hike. The board said a nationwide strike "would tie up the reconversion program."

Bay Idleness Increases
The number of workers in the San Francisco bay area made idle by a strike of 10,000 AFL and CIO machinists increased to about 45,000 today as labor and management resumed conferences aimed to settle the work stoppage. Operations in some 200 plants in the area were halted or curtailed and the closing of a plant producing paper cartons threatened milk deliveries. Milk, however, still was available in most San Francisco stores and supplies to hospitals were near normal.

Speech Encourages Union
President Truman's Tuesday night speech on wage-price policy advocating a reasonable boost in wages for workers resulted in new demands by two unions.

In Detroit, Walter P. Reuther, vice president of the CIO United Automobile Workers, demanded that General Motors corporation reconsider its "flat rejection" of the union's 30 per cent wage increase demand in view of Mr. Truman's address. The demands, which the union is asking for some half million automobile workers, were rejected by General Motors as "unreasonable."

The GM employees, as well as workers at Chrysler Corporation, in strike votes have approved work stoppages. Henry Ford II, president of the Ford Motor Co., said negotiations would begin November 20 with the CIO-UAW over the union's wage demands. A strike ballot among Ford employees is scheduled November 7.

Westinghouse Involved
In Pittsburg, the CIO-United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers asked Westinghouse Electric corporation to renew collective bargaining conferences in view of the President's wage-price policy. The union recently authorized petition for a strike vote involving 106,000 Westinghouse workers in 25 cities after the company rejected a \$2-a-day wage demand.
In New York City, 170 employees at two hospitals, Beth-El and Beth Moses, were on strike again yesterday in a dispute over the alleged failure of the hospitals to obey WLB directives granting higher wages. Nurses were kept on their jobs.

Apple Ruling Omits Oregon
WASHINGTON, Nov. 1—(AP)—A revision in apple storage charges which may be added to the ceiling price, announced yesterday by the OPA, does not apply to Washington or Oregon.

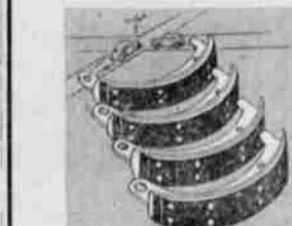
