

4-Power "Control" Of Germany Runs Into Difficulty

It is strange coincidence which brings simultaneous publication of the Eisenhower-Truman plan for early establishment of an allied civilian government for Germany and the general's official report for September that unrest among the Germans has approached the point of organized resistance.

(Press dispatches indicate no improvement in the latter since the period covered by the report.)

Although the two situations have developed independently and were made public without cross-reference, they would seem to be inextricably linked.

Offhand it appears that introduction of another governmental factor between the levels of high policy-making and the application of that policy, which obviously must remain a military job, could only further complicate an already muddled situation.

Proposal Not Clarified

Eisenhower's report on occupation conditions (as distinguished from his letter advocating establishment of civil government by June) serves to solidify previous indications that the four-power control set-up in Berlin is running into serious difficulties. It fails to clarify the improvements to be expected from a group of civilians who, unlike the present control council members, would not even be bound together through having participated in a common war.

Since Eisenhower makes it clear that the Army will have to remain in occupation for a long time, and since it is now charged with both police work and organization of civilian affairs, he might desire a clear-cut division between the two. He obviously is irked with the situation in the Berlin control council. He as much as says that he has been giving in for the sake of unity when caught in the minority, but that the others have not. He has had several years now of being forced to discuss political factors into his approach to military objectives. He could hardly be blamed if he feels a little tired of it all and would prefer the relative simplicity of strictly military duties.

Yet Eisenhower is hardly the man to agree with any policy which might endanger the ultimate accomplishment of what the Army fought for. He must feel that Germany can best be started back on the road to self-government through early civilian control, and that the advantages of such a program outweigh the complications which are bound to arise. But whether the objectives of the general's letter to the president can be attained would seem to depend largely on how well he can clear up, between now and June, the matters in his September report.

Army Recruiters Dated in Roseburg

Lt. Col. Robert L. Irving and Sgt. Deane F. Thomas of the Eugene office of the Army recruiting service will be at the Roseburg armory Monday and Tuesday, November 5 and 6, for the purpose of interviewing persons interested in enlisting in the regular army.

Qualified men between the ages of 17 and 35 may be accepted for enlistment in the regular Army for 18 months, two

years and three years. Men enlisting now become eligible for all provisions of the GI Bill of Rights on discharge, have the privilege of national service life insurance and may receive family allowance for dependents, in addition to the usual benefits of Army service.

Men with prior service may enlist in grades held at the time of discharge and if enlistment is made prior to February, 1946, this grade will be permanent. In addition such men may receive up to 90 days furlough if they enlist within 20 days of date of discharge. A furlough travel allowance at the rate of five

cents per mile to home and back will be paid to a soldier granted reenlistment furlough. A reenlistment allowance of \$50 for each year of service just completed is payable to men who reenlist within 90 days after discharge.

How to master the art of coffee making

Making a cup of good coffee is really an art, but a simple art in which anyone can become adept. There are about five rules that have become second nature to me in brewing coffee at home. Perhaps it's their very simplicity that spells success . . . what would you say?

1. First and foremost, I select the proper grind for the type of coffee maker I expect to use in brewing the coffee. This, of course, eliminates my having to have vacuum-packed coffee reground. It has been my experience that having already-ground coffee put through the grinder a second time too often results in loss of flavor and aroma of the coffee. And the brew made from twice-ground coffee is usually cloudy and bitter. (NOTE: Many of you, I know, prefer whole-bean coffee which is ground right at the grocers at the time of purchase. A delicious brew can be obtained by this method if you remember that just one grinding is sufficient.)

2. I MEASURE both coffee and freshly boiling water accurately. I know it is important to use the same exact proportions every time coffee is made to be sure it will always taste the same. A good rule of thumb for coffee that is rich in flavor, as well as strength, is one heaping tablespoon (or two level tablespoons) of coffee to each 6-oz. cup, or 3/4 standard measuring cup, of freshly boiling water.

3. I TIME my coffee-making carefully. The coffee should be in contact with the water for a definite length of time, depending on the type and capacity of your coffee-maker, as well as the strength of beverage desired.

4. I make it a point to SERVE coffee SOON after it is made. Cool coffee cannot be reheated without injuring its flavor.

5. I CLEAN the coffee-maker daily, and at least twice a month give it a baking soda bath to keep it "sweet."
