

Wheat Subsidies Fixed By Government Agency

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The Reconstruction Finance Corp. announced today that subsidies on wheat ground into flour, except on the Pacific coast, will be 30 cents a bushel for the month of November. This is an increase of 3 cents a bushel.

All wheat ground in the Pacific area, and wheat produced there but ground elsewhere will get a 33-cent-a-bushel subsidy. This is a 5-cent increase over last month.

total corporate saving of \$3,136,000,000;

Excise Levies Retained—End the "use tax" on cars and boats, reducing federal revenue by \$140,000; and

Freeze the social security payroll tax throughout 1946 at the present rate of 1 per cent each on employers and employees.

The bill makes no change in the wartime excise taxes on such things as cosmetics. The House had voted to set these back to their 1942 rates next July but the Senate balked.

Individuals drawing salaries or wages will feel the benefits immediately after January 1. They'll have smaller tax withholdings from their pay envelopes.

Examples of Benefits—Savings to individuals under the new income tax provisions are illustrated by such comparisons as these:

A married person with two dependents, salary \$1,800 a year, tax under old law \$39, none under new. Married man, no dependents, \$7,000 income, \$1,555 tax under old law, \$1,292 under new. Single person, \$2,500 salary, \$460 old law, \$380 new.

Persons with incomes less than \$5,000 can read their tax liability directly off tables which will be prepared and sent out by the Internal Revenue bureau.

Those who have to figure their tax will find the going more complicated. First, the 3 per cent normal tax is put on the same exemption basis as the graduated surtax (\$500 apiece for the taxpayer and each dependent). Second, the surtax rate is trimmed by 3 percentage points in each bracket. Finally, the taxpayer is allowed to reduce the total normal and surtax obligation, thus figured, by 5 per cent.

Veterans who served in the enlisted ranks will be forgiven all federal income taxes on their service pay from 1941 on. Officers get additional time in which to pay up their back taxes without interest.

inction between those openly blamed and those considered to have been indirectly responsible. Edwin W. Pauley, American member of the reparations committee, voiced what for the Japanese was a revolutionary conception in asserting that there could be no distinction between the emperor and his government.

The Japanese have considered the government as an instrument of the emperor, but he personally has been held too high to be responsible for its mistakes.

Secret War Maps Found—

Supreme headquarters, in a new directive, told the Japanese to freeze the bank accounts and other property of all members and former officials of the puppet Philippine government, including those of Pres. Jose B. Laurel and his two sons, Pacenlah and Arsenio.

Special American detectives unearthed nearly two tons of secret

Japanese military maps including many on Alaska, and one set of carefully segregated Civil War Gettysburg battle maps. Why the latter were held was not explained.

Japanese and American authorities were also hunting today for huge amounts of missing war material and funds. The Japanese war ministry, to quiet public clamor for an accounting of tax payments, began an audit of the billions squandered by the Army and Navy on their lost war. It hoped to find, too, great quantities of military goods which disappeared between the surrender and the occupation.

American military police extended their search for some \$500,000 worth of U. S. Army rations and clothing which apparently had been diverted into civilian channels through a big black market operation.

Four American soldiers and several Italian and Japanese nationals were arrested yesterday for questioning.

large scale migrations of workers between the states.

The House attached the provision for quick return to the states to a bill withdrawing \$52,000,000,000 in war appropriations.

Delay in Return Opposed—Senate leaders obviously hoped to increase the 30 days, but there were indications that any attempt to run the period out to many months would run into substantial opposition.

Less than six weeks ago the Senate voted 56 to 23 to return U. S. E. S. to the states within 90 days. The vote was on an amendment by Senator Ladd, usually a staunch administration supporter, to a jobs pay bill. That bill has since been bottled up in a House committee.

Senator Reed asked the Appropriations committee to hear him at a closed session as a witness for state control.

"The U. S. E. S. is not an efficient service under the federal government, never has been and so far as any of us can see it never will be," he told reporters.

"It has never rendered as good service as it did under the states but its costs have increased 400 per cent."

President Roosevelt promised when he took it over that it would be returned after the war. Now the federal government is stalling.

Chungking they would fire on government troops landing from American ships in Communist "liberated areas" but General Chou denied this.

Favoritism Disclaimed—

Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, commander of American military forces in China, has agreed in interviews that the role of his men in redistributing central government forces does strengthen Chiang's position but has insisted such does not constitute direct action against the Communists.

The central government recently proposed that the Communist forces in the trouble spots of North China withdraw from railroad lines as evidence of good faith in return for permission to police sectors they now occupy.

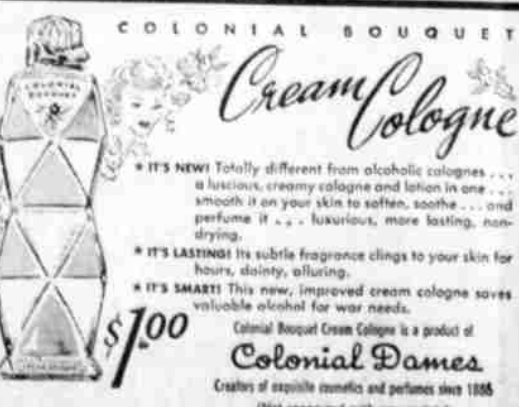
