

Papooses, Juniors Of Grants Pass Play 7-to-7 Tie

The Roseburg Junior High school Papooses played the Grants Pass Junior Cavemen to a 7 to 7 tie on a muddy field at Grants Pass Wednesday.

Both teams scored after mistakes in judgment by their opponents. Grants Pass scored in the second period when, after being warned not to attempt runbacks of punts because of a slippery ball, a Roseburg player in his excitement caught a punt on his own one-yard line when, had he allowed the ball to bounce, it would have gone into the end zone, which would have required play to be resumed on the 20-yard line. Roseburg fumbled on the second play and Grants Pass recovered, punching over from the one-yard line on the second try, with only two seconds left to play in the first half. The conversion was made on a sleeper play.

The Papooses drove to the Grants Pass one-yard line in the third period, following a beautiful forward pass, but were held on downs inches short of the goal line.

Tied in Final Period

In the fourth period, with only two minutes left to play, Grants Pass, leading 7 to 0 and playing on their own 15-yard line, attempted a forward pass. Blank, Roseburg end, broke through to the passer and knocked the ball from his hand. The ball rolled over the goal line and Blank fell on it for the touchdown. A smash through center added the extra point and tied the score.

The game was the second of a double-header and was played on a very wet and muddy field, which had been trampled by teams meeting in the first contest.

The Papooses will play their next game on Finlay Field Saturday, November 17, against the Medford Juniors. It will be an afternoon game, starting at 1 o'clock.

Baruch Urges Close Guard Over Germany and Japan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Bernard M. Baruch said today "the Germans and Japanese will strive unceasingly through science, technology and engineering to devise some means for waging a Third world war."

The United States should establish a national science foundation whose duties would include counsel for "effective policing of the war-related science of Germany and Japan," the adviser to presidents asserted.

"The long-time control of the scientific resources of Germany and Japan must continue for many years after the last occupation troops leave those lands—until there has been a spiritual rebirth of those peoples," he said.

Tunney's Rap at Coming Title Bout Angers Billy Conn

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Billy Conn, angry that Navy Lieut. Conde Tunney asserted his June title bout with Joe Louis would be a "flop," said the former world heavyweight champion was talking like a "playboy admiral," the Philadelphia Record reported today.

Conn told the Record that Tunney's charge was "ridiculous." Tunney had stated that if the Conn-Louis fight is held it "will be drastically injurious to boxing" because neither man had fought in over three years except in exhibition bouts.

The Record said "Conn's counterthrust was unprintable," but quoted the challenger: "It's lucky the fellows in the Army weren't like him (Tunney). He thought the war could be won by doing pushups."

Tunney, in condemning the fight, said the Pittsburgh boxer, recently discharged from service, "has not been a teetotaler." "That shows you how ridiculous Tunney is," Conn was quoted in the Record. "I take a little drink now and then. I don't smoke or chew. But Tunney has said if Louis smoked for six weeks he himself could beat him in his present condition. That's a joke. Joe could

smoke a whole tobacco factory and still lick Tunney without any trouble."

Conn, according to the Record, denied Tunney's claim that welterweight Sugar Robinson could beat him (Conn) in a 15-round bout.

"I don't have anything against Sugar," Conn told the Record, "but I'll bet I can lick both Tunney and him."

Conn said he weighs 190 now and expects to train down to 183 by June "nine pounds more than I weighed last time I fought Louis. I'm in pretty good shape, after three and a half years in the army. Despite Tunney, all the GI's aren't playboys."

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 1.—(AP)—Plain citizen Joe Louis, erstwhile technical sergeant in the Army, said today: "He'll have to knock out Billy Conn to win their bout for the world's heavyweight championship next summer."

Louis had this to say about Conn: "I knew I was behind on points going into the 13th round the first time I fought him. Maybe my handlers thought I wasn't but I saw a lot of Billy's gloves and I knew best. I expect him to out-box me again. That man, he's fast, mister. But I'll beat him and the only way I can do it is cool him. When? Soon as I can."

Four Nations to Share In Jap Fleet Remnants

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes announced today that Russia, Britain and China would share equally with the United States in a division of that part of the Japanese fleet which is not destroyed. The vessels to be divided in-

clude 38 destroyers and an undisclosed number of small, coastal defense ships of 800 to 900 tons.

Those to be destroyed—Byrnes spoke of scuttling them—are a battleship, four aircraft carriers of which three are damaged; four cruisers of which three are damaged; and 51 submarines.

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Non-Attendance At Schools to Go Under Inquiry Here

To aid in enforcement of the new state law requiring school attendance up to the age of 18 years, unless officially excused, Laura C. Gorrell, county school superintendent and secretary of the non-high school board, is calling upon clerks in all non-high districts to furnish names of persons up to 18 years of age not now attending school.

A meeting will be held at 10 A. M., Wednesday, November 7, at the office of the county school superintendent, at which time all individuals under 18 years of age and not attending school will be required to be present. The board will consider each case to determine whether an excuse should be granted or school attendance required, Mrs. Gorrell reports.

Failure to report at the meeting can be penalized by imposition of a fine, Mrs. Gorrell states. In case of illness, a representative from the family may appear on behalf of the young person. Students, Mrs. Gorrell reports, are responsible to their individual districts, but in those districts in

which no high schools are maintained, the non-high school board has jurisdiction.

M. B. Emmitt to Handle Airplane Agency Here

Marion B. Emmitt of Coles Valley announced today that he has secured a distributor's license for Stinson and Aeronca light planes for the Douglas county area and will establish an agency at the Roseburg airport. He attended a display in Portland this week of the postwar models. The agency, Emmitt reports, will handle a complete line of parts for all makes of light planes, and a stock of model planes. He anticipates deliveries of new ships about December 15.

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
