New Stamp Honors G. I. Joe



A new khaki-colored 3-cent stamp, pictured above, honoring the U. S. Army, will go on sale in Washington Sept. 28, according to Postmaster General Robert Hannegan. Depicted are thousands of Army troops marching through Arc de Triomphe, Paris, while bombers fly in formation overhead.

Hog Slaughter Near Low Record; Price Supports Listed

Current hog slaughter under federal inspection is near the lowest of record, yet the number of hogs in the United States on January 1 this year was 28 per cent per capita above the 1935-1939 average. Preliminary estimates indicated some increase in the number of hogs in the country next January 1.

The goal for the 1946 spring pig crop is about equal the spring pig crop of 1945, however. Effective October 1, 1945, to September 30, 1947, the support price, Chicago basis, is to average \$12. That is compared with \$13 at present and until next September 30.

Although the average support for the year ending September 30, 1947, is to be \$12, there will be seasonal adjustments according to normal seasonal changes in hog prices. For example, the support price in December, 1946, is to be \$10.75 at Chicago and \$13.25 in September, 1947. There will also be regional differentials above and below the Chicago basis. These seasonal and regional adjustments are intended to encourage more normal hog production.

The support price is intended to reflect 90 per cent of the expected parity price. As of September 15 the parity price for hogs was \$12.60, but the actual national average price to farmers was \$14.10 or 112 per cent of parity.

Consumer demand and purchasing power is so strong that terminal market prices have held firmly at the ceilings. The average farm price of hogs in Oregon at mid-September was \$14.90. That compares with \$8.60 as the 1935-1939 average.

Total meat production in 1946 and in 1947 is expected to be about as large as this year, if hog production holds in line with the goals. If the supply is not too great in relation to the demand, hog prices may average even higher than the support price.

Wage Increases Denied To Shipyard Workers

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The War Labor board today denied shipyard union requests for wage increases on the Pacific coast, Gulf coast and Great Lakes zones and declined to study wage structure.

The board is liquidating by January 1, and could not undertake the study, it said. Previously the same wage denial and refusal to undertake the 1945 wage review had been applied on the Atlantic coast.

The unions had asked for a 17-cent hourly increase at the 1944 wage review. The whole question is left by the board to the Shipbuilding Stabilization committee.

Turkish Chief Foresees New Treaty With Russia

ANKARA, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The national assembly, apprehensive over the imminent end of the treaty of friendship and non-aggression with the Soviet Union, weighed today the declaration of President Inonu that Turkey has "no debts to pay anybody."

The assembly, opening on a note of anxiety over the future of the Bosphorus and Dardanelles straits, Turkish controlled lanes to the Black Sea, was told in an address by the president.

"I have no illusion that it will be easy to explain to Russia, Britain or the United States the Turkish role in the war," he said. He had the last hope of concluding an understanding with the Soviet Union, Turkey, entered the war against the Axis only last March at the request of the Allies.

More Dairy Products to Be Sent Overseas by U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Liberated Europe will receive greatly increased quantities of dairy products from this country in the last three months of 1945, the Agriculture department announced today.

France, including French North Africa, Belgium, the Netherlands and the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation administration have been allocated more than 450,000,000 tons of dairy products for the quarter.

This is about four times more than this country has made available in any previous quarter. Despite the increased exports, the department said in a statement, more butter, cheese, evaporated milk and dried milk will be available for U. S. civilians.

The greater allocations reflect record milk production this year.
