**CALIFORNIA 1945 MOTHER WAS VISITOR IN ROSEBURG AT W. G. PAUL HOME, 1926**

Of much interest in Roseburg is the announcement that Mrs. Albert T. Quon, nee Lily Ho, who visited in Roseburg in 1926 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Paul at Hillcrest ranch, has been chosen the 1945 California state mother. Mrs. Quon was just newly from China, when she came to Roseburg to be with the Paul family for six weeks and during which time she was entertained by a number of Roseburg women, who became her very good friends.

Mrs. Quon was chosen by the Golden Rule Foundation, which annually selects the State Mothers as well as the American Mother. Such awards are usually given to older women, women with sons and daughters in the armed services, women with children and grandchildren who have distinguished themselves in world affairs, women with graying hair. But Mrs. Quon is a new kind of mother, a young mother with four young children, the oldest only 14 years of age, a woman representing not only the new era of youth and young, vigorous ideas, but a new era in world relationships.

Ellen Jensen Watumull tells Mrs. Quon's story in the October 1945 issue of the magazine "Asia," stating, "Mrs. Quon was born Lily Ho in Honolulu, which made her an American citizen by right of birth. When she was still a very young child her family returned to Nanking, China, and she was reared in traditional Chinese home, and given the best possible education in China before being sent abroad for higher studies.

When she returned to the United States, she went to the Los Angeles home of two sisters who are the sisters of W. G. Paul of Roseburg, who had taught for many years in China. She tells how, on her first evening, she found herself alone in the living room after dinner. She finally looked for the sisters and discovered them in the kitchen. It hadn't occurred to Lily, reared in a home with many servants, that there were dishes to be washed and the sisters, understanding Chinese life, had said nothing about it. Although she had never washed a dish in her life, Lily insisted on sharing the work, and so had her first lesson in domestic science.

At the University of Southern California, she met young Albert Quon. Both he and Lily were outstanding in their studies and in student affairs. Lily was graduated "cum laude," and, having majored in music, returned to China to teach music in Chianan and Shanghai universities.

The Ho family had traditional Chinese plans for Lily to marry a young man of their choice, but she insisted, with real courage, on marrying Albert Quon, and the family graciously yielded. Albert brought his bride back to Los Angeles. Here their first child, Albert, was born, but when she was still a baby, the little family moved to San Diego. Albert and his brother had established there the now famous Quon-Quon company. The family was soon augmented by Lillian and again, after a trip to China, by Jeannette. With three girls already, Albert became a bit discouraged in his hopes for a son. But 14 months after Jeannette came, Ronald was born and the family was complete.

Albert's expanding business made it necessary for the family to move back to Los Angeles, but now began a heart-breaking search for a suitable home. California had welcomed the Chinese in the early days when the need for labor was great, but had kept them in camps and on the "other side of the tracks." Here, however, was a family cultured, intelligent, American in every sense of the word. For six months Albert combed the city, until he finally found their present home, in a pleasant neighborhood. Countless American friends have enjoyed the Quon's generous hospitality, distinguished visitors from China have here experienced home life in America, many Chinese Air Force cadets have had happy hours in the Quon home learning American songs and games, and from the four Quon children schoolmates have unconsciously gained an understanding of China.

All four of the children are honor students in school and all of them are able musicians. Eagerly anticipated events are the recitals which the children give each June. The girls are all ardent Girl Scouts. Lillian has been elected president of five of her classes in Junior High school, and Albert is an excellent cook.

Each Sunday brings cousins with their families to spend the afternoon and Lily often cooks

Sunday dinner for 14 or more people. Last Christmas the Quon roof sheltered 21 grown-ups and children for five days.

Lily also finds time and energy to head the Chinese Women's Society of Los Angeles, to work unceasingly for China Relief, to talk before many organizations during the National War Chest Drive, to attend the Hollywood Opera Reading club and the Friday Morning club lectures and to help the Chinese U.S.O. And she is never happier than when she can present a distinguished Chinese visitor to her friends and know that, in Los Angeles, at least, there is an ever-widening group of people who have come to understand the importance of China's culture and its contribution to American culture.

The selection of Mrs. Quon as California state mother is not only a tribute to her, but a testimony that the qualities that characterize a good mother are inherent in every nationality. It may be that in future and in other states American Mothers women of many other races and countries—Italian, Filipino, Russian, Spanish, Mexican, East Indian—whose composite courage and intelligence have made the United States a strong, idealistic and democratic nation.

The scroll was presented to Mrs. Quon at a luncheon of the Friday Morning club, an organization of some 2,000 members. A few years ago, when racial discrimination was particularly keen in California, the Friday Morning club had the courage to welcome Mrs. Quon as a member.
