Traces of Civilization 8,000 Years Ago Found

LONDON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Dr. Naill Al Asil said here archaeologists had discovered traces at the Iraq city of Hassura of a civilization which existed 8,000 years ago, proving that man was civilized up to 2,000 years earlier than was previously believed.

The find may provide "the missing link in the history of man," said Dr. Al Asil, 50-year-old head of Iraq's delegation to the United Nations Education and Cultural conference here and a noted archaeologist.

He said two American archaeologists were planning to go to Iraq this winter to join an expedition to investigate the discoveries.

Hassura is 400 miles north of the spot where the Sumerian civilization was unearthed. Dr. Al Asil said excavations had been completed at Hassura, but that there were many other mounds nearby which might reveal unlimited mysteries.
