Strawberry Acreage in Oregon to Be Increased

Next year's strawberry acreage harvested in the United States is expected to be 19 per cent larger than the acreage harvested this year. That is, if growers are able to carry out intentions indicated by recent reports to the crop reporting service. This acreage, however, is still 30 per cent below the 1935-1944 average.

A sharp increase in the acreage of strawberries for harvest in Oregon next year is also in prospect. A total of 8200 acres, compared to 6600 acres picked this year or an increase of 24 per cent is shown by preliminary figures. This is 37 per cent above the recent low point reached in 1944; but it is about 40 per cent below the 1941 peak.

Oregon is expected to drop to fourth position in strawberry acreage. It would be outranked by Louisiana, Tennessee, and Arkansas.

Lower Averages Seen For Farm Dairy Prices

Prices received by dairy farmers during 1946 are expected by the USDA to average slightly lower than in 1944 and 1945 due to a weakening in demand. While prices rose more sharply in World War I than in World War II, government incentive payments, beginning in October of 1943, have maintained unit returns to dairy producers at levels consistently higher than in 1914-20. The USDA sees no indication for 1946 of such a sharp price decline as occurred in 1921. Milk production is likely to be somewhat smaller in 1946 than the record-breaking 123 billion pounds in sight this year. Actual levels of income returns from dairy products and production in 1946 are tied in with government action on various subsidy and price ceiling programs for next year.

Nation Turns to Oregon for Seed For Forage Crops

The nation is looking to Oregon more and more as a source of seed for better forage crops, says E. R. Jackson, extension specialist in farm crops at O.S.C. Right now people from nearly every state in the Union are writing to obtain information or seed of the new non-shattering strain of tall oat grass, recently named Tualatin grass.

The old, tall oat grass has been the highest yielding grass at most state experiment stations, but seed is usually scarce because such a high percentage of it shatters on the ground before it can be harvested. This has caused seed growers to shy away from it, Jackson explains.

The Tualatin strain, originated at the Oregon experiment station, is practically shatter-proof. While Oregon seed growers are now going into production of Tualatin grass seed, there is a market for several times the present production.

Other seed crops in which out-of-state growers are showing increased interest are alta fescue, meadow foxtail and subterranean clover. Cumberland and midland clovers are also in demand, far exceeding the Oregon supply, Jackson adds.
