Small Holders Party Wins Hungary Election

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The small holders party, representing the center and conservative elements in Hungary, apparently swept the country Sunday in the first free general elections held in central Europe since the war.

Incomplete returns showed the small holders party made a slight gain over its votes in Budapest's municipal balloting of a month ago when it surprised even its own leaders by walking off with the election. Final totals will be delayed until the vote can be counted from the 16 national voting districts.

On the basis of the present returns it appeared the small holders would capture about 60 per cent of the vote, the Social Democrats about 20 per cent, and the Communists 12 to 15 per cent with other small parties trailing.

Assn. of Evangelicals' Regional Secretary to Speak at Meeting Here

Mr. Nagel is a former missionary of Europe and the Near East, where he worked before the outbreak of the present war. He is executive secretary of the N.A.E. for the Pacific Northwest. The association is a cooperative fellowship of Bible-believing Christians, representing more than 20 denominations. It grew out of a conference of 15 men, held in Chicago in October, 1941, and today numbers in excess of a million constituents. The announced purpose of this meeting is to create a greater fellowship of Evangelicals and encourage a broader program for united action.

Wheeler, Hoover Answer Red Charge Of "Isolationists"

LONDON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The Moscow radio yesterday broadcast an attack upon "American isolationists" and accused them of being "originators of the idea of using economic and military might as a means of exerting pressure on other countries."

Former President Herbert Hoover and Senators Robert A. Taft (R., Ohio), and Burton K. Wheeler (D., Mont.) were singled out for special mention. "The American isolationists Taft and Wheeler have tried to take advantage of a discussion of international problems for their own provocative ends," the broadcast said, quoting from an article in the Red Fleet magazine.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.) said yesterday that "Russia and her satellites are the greatest isolationists in the world today."

He made this comment in an interview on a Moscow radio broadcast denouncing "American isolationists" and accusing them of being "originators of the idea of using economic and military might as a means of exerting pressure on other countries."

In New York, Herbert Hoover issued this statement: "If advocating human freedom, justice, the compliance with agreement, the use of American resources to relieve suffering and their use exclusively to rebuild productivity in the world is isolationism, then the world has a new and noble meaning. If Russia is willing to cooperate to those ends, I welcome it."
