The Roseburg High school Indians will play their last scheduled home game of the season Friday night when they meet Grants Pass in the annual Armistice day football battle. The game is being played Friday night instead of on the holiday as usual, due to the fact that both teams have games scheduled for Nov. 10 and two contests only five days apart would place too much strain upon the squads.

The Indians, Co. J. Mel Ingram reports, will be in the best physical condition since the University High game Oct. 5. All regulars will be back in the lineup, although Evans, quarterback, and Ulrich, fullback, probably will see only limited action. Harvey, Roseburg's fleet halfback, has rapidly regained strength following a severe cold and, with his teammate, Pope, probably will get plenty of work in Friday's game.

The Indians will play their final scheduled game at Sweet Home, Nov. 16, after which uniforms will go into storage unless arrangements can be made for a Thanksgiving day game. Ingram reports the Indians still are available for a holiday game on the home field, but to date no opponent has accepted the challenge.

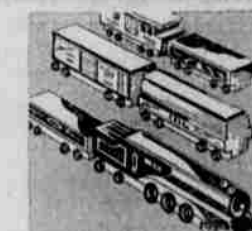

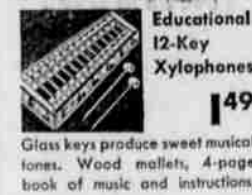
