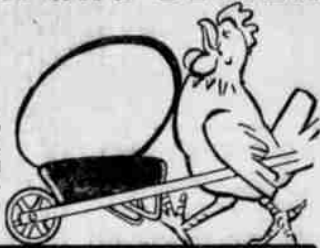

Legislation Ready For Liberalizing GI Bill of Rights

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Legislation broadening the GI bill of rights to make it easier for veterans to get loans and schooling has been approved by the Senate Finance committee.

Chairman Walter F. George said it probably would be taken up in the Senate later in the week. The bill would do these things:

Loans: Authorize government-guaranteed loans based on "reasonable" rather than "reasonable normal" value of property. Veterans have complained that in a rising real estate market they are unable to buy what they want at "normal" prices.

Permit loans to furnish working capital for business and farms, as well as for real estate. Maximum Loan Uppe

Extend the time which veterans may apply for loans to 10 years after the war, instead of five, as at present.

Raise the maximum term of home loans from 20 to 25 years, and of farm loans from 20 to 40 years.

Education: Open the educa-

tional program to veterans irrespective of age.

Increase the living allowance for single veterans attending educational institutions from \$50 to \$65 a month, and for veterans with dependents from \$75 to \$90.

School Deals Approved

Authorize the veterans' administration to enter into agree-

ments with state educational institutions for payments of tuition of veterans.

Open the way for veterans to take short technical courses or correspondence courses in state-approved institutions with the government footing the tuition bill. The present \$500 per school year limit on tuition stands.

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
