

Willamette Area Logging Conclave Dated at Eugene

Ed Loney, Rutherford, and Kenneth Ford, Roseburg, are among Douglas county loggers who will participate in the seventh annual Willamette Valley Logging conference at Eugene on November 16-17 at the Osburn hotel. Advance reservations indicate

this will be the heaviest attended of any of these western Oregon loggers' get-togethers, according to H. J. Cox, secretary of the conference.

Colonel W. B. Greeley, nationally prominent forester, will give the main address at the annual loggers' banquet on Friday night, at which Roy Morse, Longview logging superintendent, will be toastmaster.

New logging equipment and new logging techniques will be among panel discussions presented to the conference, reports Captain F. L. Thompson, Albany, president. Truck road construction and truck road transportation will draw a lively discussion from the floor. Where will new loggers and foresters come from, is the topic of a talk by Walter F. McCulloch.

"We would like to have every Douglas county logger attend the Eugene meet," said Captain F. L. Thompson in talking with a News-Review correspondent. "I believe there is much to learn in better logging methods at this conference, and an excellent chance for members of the 'timber beast' fraternity to get together and exchange ideas."

Lady members, wives of loggers will be guests of the conference at a strictly feminine loggessette banquet at the Eugene hotel on Friday night, November 16, while the more lusty members of the clan gather at the Osburn for the traditional banquet of loggers.

Washington Cities Vote Bonds For War Memorials

(By The Associated Press) Elections around Washington State yesterday were keynoted by approval of bond issues for war memorials, mostly in the form of swimming pools and recreation parks.

In Walla Walla, approval was voted for a memorial to take the shape of a recreation park to contain a swimming pool, ball fields, a golf course and numerous other facilities.

At Centralia, voters approved a bond issue to raise \$85,000 for the building of a municipal swimming pool as a memorial to World War II. In the mayoralty elections there, Dr. O. E. Nelson was elected mayor for a three-year term, defeating George C. Lange 1,192 to 753.

In Bellingham, the city's voters approved a referendum calling for expenditure of \$40,000 on a memorial swimming pool, contingent on the raising of another \$40,000 by popular subscription. The incumbent mayor Arthur H. Howard was reelected, defeating the man who led him in the primaries, H. Boyd Talbot. Howard polled 4,334 ballots against 2,987 for Talbot.

Vancouver Race Close Early returns from Vancouver, Washington's, balloting gave mayor Fred S. Sinclair a slim advantage in his campaign for reelection to the job he was appointed to a year ago. Unofficial returns gave Sinclair 1,256 and Marion Sexton, former state legislator, 1,145.

Mayor L. Hum Kean was unopposed for reelection at Bremerton, as was Howard I. Gort, commissioner of public works. Lulu D. Haddon, city finance commissioner, apparently was reelected as shown by returns from 48 of 53 precincts reporting. She polled 1,536 votes against 1,103 for Carlton Stewart.

At Port Angeles, Fred W. Epperson was elected mayor, succeeding Vernon J. Robinson. Ernest C. Steele was named commissioner of finance and William E. Johnson, street commissioner. Voters there approved the city bus franchise.

Jap Sailor Strikes Girl For Dating U. S. Soldier

(TOKYO, Nov. 8.—AP)—The Army newspaper Stars and Stripes said yesterday a Japanese sailor struck a Japanese girl in downtown Hibiya park for dating an American soldier, and called it the first open show of resentment against fraternization. The sailor, Seaman Hisamatsu Masaharu, 19, was taken to provost marshal headquarters by a group of American soldiers and was turned over to Tokyo police. The girl was given treatment for a split lip.

A Japanese police official said Masaharu was booked and released to return to his ship. He said the sailor was engaged in repatriation duty and would be questioned later.

Legislation Threatened If Draft Not Abolished

(WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—AP)—Senator Revercomb (D-W. Va.) said today that unless the Army and Navy quit drafting men "this week" Congress should proceed immediately to end selective service itself.

Revercomb, a member of the Senate Military committee, told a reporter figures show that the draft—which took millions of men into service—can now roll to a dead stop without impairing occupation forces.

This comment was in amplifi-

cation of a Senate speech in which he said the voluntary enlistment program is getting all the men the Army and Navy need. Revercomb added on the floor that unless the services act promptly, "there will be legislation offered."

Two-Time Jail Breaker Detected in Third Try

(PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—AP)—Jesse E. Kirkland, 24, broke jail in Paducah, Ky., and fled to Oregon.

Arrested and failed at Heppner, he broke jail there. Yesterday a deputy marshal went to Kirkland's detention cell here, found him picking the lock with a metal coat hanger hook.

Kirkland and Earl Demery, 19, who were arrested at Baker after their Heppner escape, were removed to county jail to await removal to Paducah.
