measuring stick of RESULTS.)

AS for the Republican party, it
still has NO PROGRAM. Until
it gets one, it won't amount to
much. So far, it is just the opposi-
tion.

IN Detroit, incumbent Mayor
Jeffries wins a fourth term
over CIO Leader Richard Frank-
enstein, who had the all-out back-
ing of the dreaded CIO Political
Action Committee.

That might be a trend. At this
distance it looks as if a lot of
voters in Detroit may have been
afraid of TOO MUCH PAC.

CHURCHILL gets back into the
headlines.

As leader of the opposition in
parliament, he says he's pretty
sure Russia wouldn't share the
atom bomb secret if SHE ALONE
possessed it. He adds: "If the cir-
cumstances were reversed and
we or the Americans asked for
similar access to Russian ar-
senals, our request would NOT be
granted."

HE explains to parliament that
the advantage possessed by the
United States in connection with
the atom bomb consists in the
"know-how" gained from the
practical production methods "de-
veloped at enormous expense and
on a gigantic scale." Because of
this, we are ONE JUMP ahead of
the rest of the world at the pres-
ent moment.

He says Britain should help the
U. S. guard the atom bomb "as a
sacred trust for the maintenance
of peace," and intimates that the
United States should meanwhile
provide Britain with a SUPPLY
of the bombs—which we alone,
at the moment, KNOW HOW TO
MAKE.

That sounds like the estab-
lished Churchill brand of HARD
COMMON SENSE.

RUSSIA is the big mystery na-
tion of the world, and at this
particular instant Stalin is the
big mystery man.

WHERE is he? HOW is he?

FOR some reason, he didn't take
the spotlight at the big Mos-
cow celebration of the 28th an-
niversary of the bolshevik revolu-
tion. MOLOTOV appeared in-
stead.

There are two possible explana-
tions:
1. Stalin is SICK.
2. He is NOT IN RUSSIA.

HIS health is supposed to have
been bad (he recently took a
month's vacation) and may still
be so.

ALSO there are rumors (which
may be all moonshine) that he is
now or has been in the U. S.
There are other rumors that
Chiang Kai-Shek has been here.
That could mean that a BIG
DEAL is on regarding the Chi-
nese civil war.

REMEMBER that we are never
TOLD these things—the ages-
old theory being that diplomatic
negotiations must be conducted in
an atmosphere of clabbered
secrecy, with the public told about
it AFTER it has happened. So
we can only guess.

THERE are two interesting
slants in the domestic news.
Senator Revercomb, of the Sen-
ate Military Affairs committee,
asserts that the voluntary enlist-
ment program is getting ALL
THE MEN the Army and Navy
need. If that is true, and CON-

THE FORMULA FOR PEACE

When news of Germany's surrender flashed around the world on that fateful day of Nov. 11, 1918, peoples of civilized nations throughout the world went mad with joy. In a delirium of happiness, they screamed and shouted, laughed and cried, while whistles, bells and impromptu noise-makers gave tongue as well to the spirit of ecstasy saturating human hearts. For several succeeding years Armistice day was observed with gusto. Enthusiasm and spontaneity of the original celebration were revived. There were parades, entertainment, music, speaking, dancing.

Today, twenty-seven years later, Armistice day is but a shell of a holiday. In many places throughout the nation it will be a legal holiday only. Commercial activities will go on apace. There will be little recollection of the sacrifices of 1917-18; little remembrance of the "crosses, row on row," which dot the fields of Flanders.

The "forgotten men"—those men of 1917-18, who won a war while the politicians lost the peace—will remember. And in their remembrance there will be a trace of bitterness that the sacrifice of their buddies has been in vain.

But there will be little time for recrimination. The veteran of the First World War is rejoicing today in the return of his sons, his brothers and his nephews; yes, his daughters, sisters and nieces, too. He is too much concerned with the present and the future to ponder overly long upon the past, except to extract from bygone experience guidance for the perilous times that lie ahead. He has continued the fight to preserve the peace for which he and his comrades offered their lives. In his determination that we shall not fail again, he is seeking to join his strength with that of the heroes of civilization's more recent effort for preservation of democracy, that together they may conquer the evil forces which even now threaten to destroy mankind, if not the world itself.

The fervent hopes of Armistice day, 1918, were suffocated by avarice, greed, selfishness, lust for power and wealth. Those forces have not been destroyed or even weakened. In fact, fattened upon war's carrion, they are stronger than ever before and threaten through power politics, and international rivalry in trade and political domination to plunge the world into another war too horrible to contemplate.

From the war of 1917-18 came visions of a peace built upon international agreement, upon arbitration, and upon an impotent League of Nations. We have not abandoned that ideal, for we have reconstructed it into a new organiza-
tion, the United Nations, implemented, this time, with a police force charged with the task of protecting the peace.

But treaties and agreements become scraps of paper unless backed by the will and determination of an informed and enlightened people. A peace founded upon international agreement is like a house built upon the sands, unless supported by willingness of the people who compose nations to act with tolerance, patience and understanding in their international relationships.

Sacrifices of the men of 1917-18, or of the men of 1941-45 cannot assure peace. Peace can never be maintained through force of arms. Peace is a living thing, fostered only in the hearts of men. Permanent peace must stem from preponderant determination of civilized people that the horror of war shall not again be visited upon the earth—a determination that will strike down those evil forces which even now set the stage for another catastrophe so great that the world may perish through its own anarchy.

If peoples of the world can only learn that peace is not to be reached through conferences, agreements and treaties, but through a simple formula given centuries ago, "Do Unto Others—", then those who died shall not have died in vain.

The Community Chest budget has not yet been raised but it can be if those who have not given will do so—remembering that thirty-two different agencies are being financed in this one campaign.

Seventy per cent of the Community Chest budget is to finance local Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls, Recreational Program, Salvation Army, Veterans' Christmas Cheer, and Cancer Control.
