## Five Germans Hanged for Killing 6 Yank Fliers

BURCHSAL, Germany, Nov. 13  
—UP—Five German civilians pro-  
testing they had done nothing  
wrong, were hanged in Barchsal  
prison Saturday for the murder  
of six American fliers who para-  
chuted from a disabled plane  
near Rueselsheim Aug. 26, 1944.  
Protesting his innocence, one  
doomed man said he fired pistol  
bullets into one of the injured  
and helpless Americans because  
the American "stuck his tongue  
out at me."  
Of the remainder of 11 de-  
fendants in the case, one was  
acquitted, two were sentenced to  
five years imprisonment, one to  
15 years and two women were  
sentenced to be hanged. The sen-  
tences of the women were com-  
muted to 30 years imprisonment  
by Lt. Gen. Geoffrey Keyes, com-  
mander of the U. S. Seventh  
army.

## Sabotage Cases During Wartime Noted by FBI

More than 19,000 cases of re-  
ported sabotage were investigated  
by the FBI during the war period,  
with 2,900 cases proving to in-  
volve some form of sabotage,  
mostly technical in nature, J. E.  
Thornton, special agent for the  
state of Oregon, told a meeting  
of law enforcement officers at  
the courthouse in Roseburg Fri-
