Last Rites Dated For Rep. J. W. Mott

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Funeral services for U. S. Representative James W. Mott, who died Monday, will be held Saturday at 2 P. M. in the House of Representatives in the State Capitol here.

It is the same chamber in which funeral services were held two years ago for the late Senator Charles McNary.

Attorney General Neuner said that if a special election were called to pick a successor to Mott, the candidates could be nominated either by assemblies of 250 persons or by petitions signed by 3,000 voters. This would make party conventions unnecessary.

However, if a special election is called, the decision on the method of nominating candidates would rest with Secretary of State Farrell.

Acting Governor Howard C. Belton said he would have nothing to say about calling an election until after the funeral.

F. W. Mode Serves On Destroyer With Notable Record

Francis W. Mode, water tender, first class, Oakland, Ore., and other crewmen of the destroyer USS McCall helped take her through 331,000 miles of sea travel and 36 major and minor Pacific campaigns without any damage from enemy action.

But of all the action in which their ship took part, the men of the McCall remember as vividly as any of her battle engagements the day she made history by rescuing the now almost legendary radioman, George Tweed, from Guam.

It was the McCall that inched her way to within 400 yards of the shore after responding to a mysterious series of heliograph signals from an inland hill. Standing boldly by, the destroyer sent a small boat which picked up the Navy radioman, who had lived on Guam for more than two years during the Jap occupation while the Japs sought him in vain.

The McCall also is credited with picking up 36 fliers from the Pacific, including five snatched almost from under Jap guns at Chichi Jima.

Parole Granted Money Larcenist

Anthony John Campaign, indicted by the grand jury on a charge of larceny in a dwelling, was paroled in circuit court today from a sentence of one year in the penitentiary, after changing his plea from innocent to guilty as preparations were made for his trial. Campaign was accused jointly with Clayton S. Roland with the theft of \$136 from the Marcellus Pate home at Myrtle Creek, District Attorney H. A. Canaday told the court. He admitted receiving \$45 of the stolen money, and Circuit Judge Wimberly conditioned his parole upon returning the money within a period of 90 days. Roland is in jail awaiting sentence, after pleading guilty on a district attorney's information.

The case of the State of Oregon against Alex Steve West, accused of stabbing Fred J. Hayes during an altercation at Canyonville, went to the jury shortly before noon today, after testimony had been taken showing both men had been drinking. West claimed self defense. The court prepared this afternoon.

Martinelli, Jones Dated for Battle

A grudge match between Angelo Martinelli and Rufus "Pinky" Jones will be the main event on Promoter Don Owen's weekly Saturday night wrestling show at the Roseburg Armory.

The two battlers put on a sensational fight here several weeks ago, in which the head-butting Negro was the victor. Martinelli has demanded another chance at the hated Jones. There will be an added incentive for the grapplers a \$100 side bet on the match.

Jones was the loser in a title match at Eugene last Saturday night with Jack Lipscomb, but he claims he was the victim of illegal tactics that were worse than usual at the hands and feet of the Pacific Coast junior heavyweight champ. He claims Lipscomb had lead in his shoes and gives that as the reason for his being stomped into unconsciousness. The Alabama Negro is demanding a rematch with Lipscomb and will be out to dispose of Martinelli in order to bolster his prestige.

Martinelli, the flashy Toledo, Ohio, grappler is no pushover even for the terrible Jones and is also angling for a title match.

Drunk Fined and Jailed
Ralph D. Williams, 47, was in the Douglas county jail today, sentenced by Justice of the Peace Clarence Leonard, Drain, to five days and a fine of \$50 on a charge of being drunk on a public highway.
