Assault-Robbery Case Being Tried; Alex West Freed

The case of the State of Oregon versus Dewey Washington, charged with assault and robbery, was in progress in circuit court today, after a jury Wednesday exonerated Alex West, accused of stabbing Fred Hayes in an altercation at Canyonville. West made a plea of self defense.

Washington, whose trial was started Wednesday, is accused jointly with Ben Thomas Childers of an assault Aug. 2 upon Joe Oscar Plumlee at Reedsport. The two men are accused of going to Plumlee's trailer house, where Childers sold Plumlee a clock, and to have beaten Plumlee with a shoe and gas pipe and to have robbed him of \$175.

Washington claimed in his defense that the three had been drinking and that Plumlee and Childers were intoxicated and that he left the trailer house leaving the other two members of the party there and was at the home of friends when the assault was alleged to have occurred.

Childers, although indicted jointly with Washington, is to be tried separately, having pleaded innocent to the charge.

The jury hearing the trial of Washington is composed of Charles M. Stark, Archie L. Will, V. N. LaRaut, Marie Felt, Bertha Bayless, J. Madison, Vivian Logsdon, Mildred H. Bonbrake, Rena Helbig, Eva F. Ware, Gordon Burnett, Albert W. Cochran.

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from time to time shall be similarly treated.

Obviously with Soviet Russia primarily in mind, they then said that "we trust that other nations will adopt the same policy, thereby creating an atmosphere of reciprocal confidence in which political agreement and cooperation will flourish."

But as for the detailed knowledge of practical application of atomic energy, the three asserted that should be kept secret until the world is better organized, through the United Nations, to receive it with strong assurances that it would not be used for destructive purposes.

The proposals described in the statement presumably will be transmitted immediately to Russia and possibly to all other members of the United Nations.

In the main, these followed ideas which British sources had attributed to Prime Minister Attlee when he first arrived here but they obviously included suggestions which had not come from him.

Attlee had been represented especially as believing that any system of international inspection would be impractical yet the creation of such a system is given as one of the objectives of the United Nations commission.

New Strikes Loom in Wage Increase Demands

ers from their jobs. General Motors said 20,000 might be affected if Buick production is not resumed.

The company said the shutdown resulted from a work stoppage by CIO United Automobile workers at the Midland Steel company plant in Cleveland. The union in Cleveland said there was no strike and added that although 200 workers were discharged two weeks ago, 1,000 men still were at work.

New Strike Voted

Two new strike votes were reported. Members of CIO packinghouse workers at the Kansas City stockyards voted 222 to 8 to strike if called out by the national union officers in support of an industry-wide demand for 25 cents-an-hour wage boost.

CIO organized production workers at the plant of the Royal Typewriter company in Hartford, Conn., balloted 1,797 to 170 for a general walkout to enforce demands for a closed shop, check off and a \$2 a day wage hike. No date was set for the walkout.

Twenty-two independent bakeries in San Francisco which had been closed since Saturday by a walkout of AFL drivers in a wage dispute, resumed operations, alleviating the city's bread shortage. AFL bakers, who left their jobs in sympathy with the drivers, continued to observe picket lines at other truck plants.

The independent shops closed after the drivers struck at the Langendorf bakery plants for a 17 per cent wage increase. In Reno, Nev., bakers at all shops remained away from their jobs yesterday to attend a meeting to discuss demands for a 20 per cent wage boost.

Washington State's Treasurer Faces Charge

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 15.—(AP)—State Treasurer Russell Fluett was charged in superior court here today with misappropriating public funds, and Fluett and Vern A. Cole, Seattle broker, were charged in another information with conspiring to defraud the state of Washington.

The charges, filed by Thurston County Prosecutor Levy Johnson,

were based on the payment to Cole of a broker's commission of \$1,107.97 on a \$7,351.46 securities sale last August.

Cole returned the money to the state treasurer several weeks ago. He said he earned it but was returning it because of public criticism of the transaction. The conspiracy complaint today asserted Cole "did not perform any services to earn said commission."

W. R. Buck, Ex-Mayor of Reedsport, Passes Away

REEDSPORT.—W. R. (Wally) Buck, 71, resident and former mayor of Reedsport, died early Thursday at the North Bend hospital. A native of Oregon, Buck, at the age of 18 years became a trombone soloist with the traveling Mat Reis shows, well known to early-day residents of

Oregon. He joined the gold rush to Nevada and later went to Eugene, moving from that city to Reedsport in 1924 to operate a box factory. He served as mayor of Reedsport from 1929 to 1931. He was unmarried. A sister, Mrs. Henderson, resides in Eugene.
