Oregon Murderer Must Die, Belton's Decision

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Acting Governor Howard C. Belton today refused to commute the death sentence of Andrew W. Dennis, 45, scheduled to die at 9 A. M. Friday for the murder of a Portland woman in-law, Mrs. Anna Belle McAllen. Belton said in a statement that he could find no evidence which would justify him in reversing the Multnomah county jury's verdict that Dennis should die in the prison's lethal gas chamber. Dennis has steadfastly maintained his innocence, contending he was convicted only on circumstantial evidence. Mrs. McAllen was strangled to death January 29, 1944.

Boeing Plant Operation Normal Despite Walkout

SEATTLE, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Boeing Aircraft Company, reported operations normal at its Seattle and Renton plants today despite a walkout of members of the Supervisors association, which started late yesterday in a jurisdictional dispute with the Aeronautical Machinists Industrial District lodge. David Lombard, association treasurer, estimated 80 per cent of the association's more than 600 members were "on vacation" today. Association members protest a ruling preventing supervisors from taking jobs with the company which require membership in the machinists union. Lombard said no picket line would be established.

Yoncalla Forms Vets' Rifle Club

YONCALLA—A Veterans Rifle club, open to all Douglas county veterans, has been organized here with 30 charter members. Lloyd C. Parsons, principal of Yoncalla Union High school, was elected president; Claude Daugherty, vice-president; Albert A. Hoffman, principal of the Yoncalla grade school, secretary-treasurer. Plans are being made to install a rifle range, organize regular practice periods and conduct tournaments. Constitution and by-laws to cover the club's activities are being prepared.

The club expects to work through federal sources to secure rifles, ammunition and other equipment which the military services offer in promoting marksmanship training. Membership in the club is open to all honorably discharged or connected service men of the U. S. armed forces or those of the Allied powers. Meetings will be held at the Yoncalla school the last Monday of each month.

PASTURE OR GYMNASIUM?

All too many pastures are merely gymnasiums for livestock—exercising grounds for poorly nourished animals. But one will generally find that the good cattleman keeps good cattle on good pasture. These three are almost inseparable because good pasture is the foundation for efficient and profitable livestock production.

Recent work at the Washington Agricultural Experiment Station has demonstrated just what better pasture means in beef production. The experiments have demonstrated that grass-legume pastures produce nearly three times as many pounds of beef per acre as are secured from straight grass pastures.

During the two-year period, 1942-43, the grass-legume pastures (alfalfa-grass and sweet-clover grass) produced 223 pounds of beef per acre, while the pure grass stands (smooth brome and crested wheatgrass) produced only 87 pounds of beef per acre. Information on pasture management and improvement to suit different farm conditions is available through local County Agents or State Agricultural Colleges.

2 cups cubed cooked chicken	2 cups cooked peas
4 tablespoons chicken fat	2 cups chopped mushrooms
4 tablespoons flour	4 tablespoons chopped pimiento
2 teaspoons salt	4 egg yolks
4 cups milk	

Make a white sauce of the fat, flour, milk, and seasoning. Add chicken, peas, mushrooms, and pimiento. Heat thoroughly. Beat yolks. Add a little of the hot mixture to the eggs and mix. Remove chicken mixture from the heat. Add egg mixture. Stir well. Serve immediately over hot biscuits, waffles, or cornbread.
