**Larger Parcels May Be
Mailed to Troops Abroad**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(AP)—
Larger and heavier packages
now may be mailed to American
troops outside the United States.
The War Department said that
beginning today packages up to
42 inches long or 72 inches in
length and girth combined, and
weighing up to 11 pounds may
be sent. Previous regulations set
a limitation of 25 inches in length,
36 inches in length and girth com-
bined with a maximum weight of
five pounds.

It still will be necessary to have
a specific request from a soldier
overseas in order to send any
package weighing more than
eight ounces.

**Farm Meetings Slated
To Set '46 AAA Program**

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 16.—
(AP)—Farmers will hold 300 com-
munity meetings in Oregon during
the next two weeks to select
AAA committeemen and plan the
agricultural conservation pro-
gram for 1946.

Three committeemen—a chair-
man, vice-chairman and a third
member—will be chosen by secret
ballot to represent farmers in
each of the 300 communities.
Each committee will be respon-
sible for selecting conservation
practices to be used in its area,
and deciding how much assist-
ance may be given each farmer.

The elections will also select a
delegate to the county conven-
tion, where the 1946 county com-
mittee will be chosen.

**Prices of Nylon Hosiery
Will Be Slashed Nov. 20**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(AP)—
Prices of nylon hosiery, if you
can find them, will be 25 per
cent or more lower on Nov. 20.

Price Administrator Bowles
said yesterday the new ceiling
prices will be based on June,
1941, costs because this was "the
last normal prewar market for
nylons."

Retail prices for first-quality
full-fashioned nylons will range
from 95 cents to \$2.05 a pair as
compared with the former range
of \$1.65 to \$2.50 a pair.

OPA said women will have to
pay no more than \$1.20 to \$1.45
a pair for the most popular kind
of nylon hose—first quality, full-
fashioned, all nylon, 45 gauge.
This is 45 to 65 cents below
present prices.

**British Aide of Nazis
Draws Ten-Year Term**

LONDON, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Pat-
rick J. Dillon, 38, who described
himself as a newspaperman, was
today sentenced to 10 years in
prison on a plea of guilty to the
charge that he broadcast Nazi
propaganda while a British sub-
ject. His mother lives in New
York.

The British Broadcasting com-
pany said in the meantime that
Paul Hoffman, hangman of the
notorious Malmek (Majdanek)
prison camp, had been sentenced
to death in Lublin, Poland.

**"Ike" Doesn't Think
Another War Inevitable**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(AP)—
Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower
said today that if he thought an-
other war inevitable, he wouldn't
be here.

"I would have jumped right
out of my plane over the At-
lantic," he told the House Mil-
itary committee in answer to a
question.

He said he thinks postwar uni-
versal military training is es-
sential, but that doesn't mean
war can't be avoided.
If it did, he said, civilization
might as well give up.
