full extent of its possibilities, almost instantly all opposition has been devised?

It seems to this writer that there is only one practical answer to that question:

By adopting (and living up to) as the basic law of international relationships the principle of the Golden Rule: "Do ye unto others as ye would that others shall do unto you."

ARE human beings (as organized into NATIONS) capable of such altruism?

That is the big question. But, if not, WHAT?

THE full story of Hiroshima has not yet been told. But what of it has been told is grim enough. And remember that Hiroshima was just the first faltering step—somewhat like the first crude experiment with gunpowder.

Compare today's use of explosives in warfare (shells, bombs, mines, torpedoes, etc.) with the ancient first blunderbuss and you will get a faint idea of the frightful capabilities of atomic war.

WHICH might be easier — to make over the world to the point where the simple formula of the Golden Rule might be accepted (and LIVED UP TO) as the basic law of international relationships, or to take the consequences of unrestricted, selfish, me-first-and-to-hell-with-the-other-fellow atomic war?

WE aren't capable of answering that question as yet. Atomic war is still too new. We can't grasp it. Most of us refuse to BELIEVE it. We just shrug it off and go out to a movie—an ESCAPE movie by preference. The whole subject is still beyond the range of our mental capacity.

BUT can we continue to shrug off the atom bomb?

The accumulating developments of each new day strengthen the conviction that we CAN'T.

AFTER all, what is so TERRIBLE about this principle of the Golden Rule?

Business men—who have always been the REAL leaders of the world (as contrasted with the workmen and the diplomats, who have hogged the spotlight of history)—are making faint beginnings toward realization of the fact that the Golden Rule ACTUALLY PAYS in practice.

More and more you find intelligent business men agreeing that a contract that is fair to both parties is MORE PROFITABLE in the long run than one that gives all the benefits to ONE PARTY.

What is that but practical proof of the workability of the principle of the Golden Rule?

LET'S FINISH THE JOB

Douglas county is lagging far behind in the Victory Loan campaign. There is no reason why this should be true except that we are waiting to be urged, coaxed, entertained and cajoled into buying the bonds necessary to meet our assigned quota. We have many times the amount of money needed to reach our E bond goal lying idle in savings and checking accounts in our banks. This idle money is earning nothing. By investing it in bonds it could be immediately converted into earning capital. Yet we sit back and wait for someone to give him or her busy time to the task of salesmanship.

Here in Douglas county, where we have a record of patriotic response to every wartime appeal, our enthusiasm has been cooling alarmingly. In the early bond drives we continuously topped the list. Douglas county was widely known throughout the state for its cooperation. But as the program of war financing continued, we allowed our ardor to cool. We dropped from top spot. In the Seventh War Loan Douglas county was near the bottom of the list instead of occupying a place at the head of the column.

We are now in the last special war financing effort. The Victory Loan will mark the end of periodic campaigns to raise funds through mass sale of bonds. The federal government will continue to make its low-cost, interest-bearing securities available but will not conduct bond campaigns as was done during the war. But we are being asked to join in this one last effort to assist in the final phase of war financing.

Simply because the shooting has stopped and the boys are coming home does not mean the cost of war has ceased. In fact, war-caused expenses have declined only slightly. We must pay the cost of transporting our veterans back to their homes, separating them from service, paying the G. I. benefits to which we have been pledged, setting up educational funds, providing loans and grants, maintaining adequate hospital facilities and doing the many, many jobs incident to cleaning up after the long and fierce struggle in which we have been engaged.

It is easy to keep in step when the band is playing, but cadence becomes ragged without inspiration. While the war was in progress—when possible defeat stared us in the face—we marched together and gave of our time, our money and our effort to push the battle forward to success. But now, when the shooting has stopped, we become weary and careless, failing to cooperate in finishing the job.

Is there any good reason why it should be necessary for some busy person to take his or her time to urge you to buy Victory bonds? Your responsibility to cooperate in war financing is just as great as that of any of your neighbors. Why, then, should you wait to be coaxed into something you should be glad to do voluntarily?

Go to your nearest bank or post office today and get that idle money into interest-bearing Victory bonds. Help put Douglas county over the top quickly.

If you are one of those fortunate persons who can afford to buy the maximum amount of bonds permitted one individual—\$5,000 worth—you can become a member of The Limit Club. This is an organization of persons who buy to the limit. Or, if your financial condition will not permit membership in The Limit Club, perhaps you can join the \$1,000 club. Every person who buys a bond of \$1,000 or \$5,000 denomination will receive a handsome souvenir membership card, encased in plastic and providing a lifetime memento of financial participation in World War II. Names of members to the clubs will be published.

But it is not the \$5,000 nor the \$1,000 bond purchases that will put Douglas county over the top. For every person who can afford to buy a \$1,000 bond, there are scores who can buy Victory bonds in lesser denominations. It is the combination of all purchases, large and small, that is needed to make up our quota. If everyone in the county would invest even a small portion of his or her savings in Victory bonds tomorrow, we could surpass our goal. Here in Douglas county we have approximately three million dollars in savings deposits. We have several times that amount in checking accounts. Yet we are asked to invest only \$375,000 in Series E Victory bonds. Is there any reason, aside from lethargy, why we haven't raised our quota earlier? Is it asking too much to urge that we go to our issuing agencies and buy bonds NOW? Let's finish the job!

Heath Quarantine Rules Are Changed

PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Changes in state board of health quarantine rules, now officers, and approval of a card-sized birth certificate were announced today.

Dr. D. C. Burkes, Portland, was elected president at sessions here Saturday. Dr. L. D. Inskoep, Medford, was named first vice-president, and Dr. O. T. Wherry, Portland, second vice-president.

The board eliminated the plan of isolating homes having cases of chicken pox, measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever, glandular, tularaemia and epidemic encephalitis. Cases of rheumatic fever and infectious hepatitis were

added to those physicians are required to report.

Quantities of dried blood plasma obtained during the war by the civilian defense corps were ordered made available to needy people in non-profit institutions.

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Jones Victor Over Martinelli; Lynam Beats Davidson

Rufus Jones' head-butts were too potent for Angelo Martinelli in their return bout on the wrestling card at the Roseburg Armory last Saturday night, the Negro winning two out of three falls before a crowd estimated at 800. Rufus, after stunning Angelo with his noggin, applied a half-Boston crab hold to take the first fall in 17:17. A surf board hold gave Martinelli the second fall in 7:27. He successfully fended off head-butts in this session, but he took plenty of them in the third and final stanza and went down for an easy body press in 6:02.

In the semi-final the spectators were treated to an exhibition of judo by Joe Lynam, who conquered Buck Davidson in a three-fall affair. With a fall to the credit of each combatant, Joe paralyzed the nerves of Buck's neck with hatched-like blows from the rim of his open hand to take the third and deciding round in 11:36. Buck captured the opening fall in 24:46 by whirling Joe around the mat by his ankles and applying a Boston crab hold. Joe retaliated in the second round with a special spin of his own—a body whirl—and followed up with a body press; time 11:37.

On the next Saturday night's card, local fans will see in action for the first time "Bulldog" Jackson, the "ruffian of ruffians," who has returned to the wrestling wars after a year's semi-retirement following a hectic career on Northwest mats. His opponent will be that equally famed caveman tactician, the Grey Mask.

PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The Moro-Reedsport High school class "B" championship grid game will be played at North Bend, instead of Portland, on Thanksgiving day, the Oregon Activities association said today. Other pairings in prep school classics will place Portland's Grant Generals in Medford on Thanksgiving against the Black Tornado, defending champs. The Medford boys will try to stretch their season's straight victories to 10, while the Port-

landers hope for a ninth straight win.
