Also returning to work today were 2,000 production employees of the Aluminum Ore company at East St. Louis, Ill., who voted to end their three-week-old strike and resume negotiations with the company for a 30 per cent wage increase. They are members of the AFL Aluminum Workers union.

Some Bread Produced

In San Francisco, striking AFL bakery wagon drivers today will deliver 25,000 pounds of bread to

government installations, Army and Navy hospitals. The bread was produced over the weekend in 13 Langdon United Bakeries, which have been closed nine days by the work stoppage. The union is asking for a pay raise from \$54.50 to \$70 a week.

A strike of 700 tugboat workers tied up shipping in the port of Philadelphia for the second time in two months. Representatives of the tugboat owners and operators asserted they knew "no cause" for the walkout of deckhands, cooks and other unlicensed crewmen who are members of the United Harbor workers, affiliated with district 50 of the United Mine Workers. The union asked the National Labor Relations board four days ago for a strike vote.

indulge in a jurisdictional dispute." He labeled the CIO's statement "an attempt to cover up its 50 per cent compromise (12 1/2-cent wage increase)."

Christensen announced six striking locals have voted to tighten up the program against "hot" lumber. They include 2,519 at Seattle, with 2,000 workers; 2,942 at Albany, 2,324 at Longview, 2,714 at Dallas, 2,554 at Labanon, and 2,720 at Toledo.

Nine Plants Sign Up
About nine plants in the Seattle area and 14 near Everett, Wash., previously unorganized, have signed AFL contracts, officials announced. Some of these operations paid less than the \$1.10 minimum before becoming unionized. Christensen said, but operators yielded to the threat of strike and the lowest minimum in the newly signed plants now is \$1.12 1/2 cents.

One plant with a new AFL contract, the R. E. Martin Lumber company of Missoula, Mont., has agreed to a \$1.25 hourly base pay the AFL said.

Seattle union officials reported more jobs available outside the lumber industry than striking AFL men can fill.

Iranian Troops Sent to Quell Revolt in Province

TEHERAN, Iran, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The Iran parliament decided in a special meeting today to send two battalions of troops to Russian-occupied Azerbaijan province, where armed insurgents have occupied some of the major towns and are reported marching on the Iran capital.

Whether Russian troops would permit entrance of the Iran forces to the trouble area was uncertain.

On previous occasions the government's troops dispatched northward to restore control over trouble spots have been stopped.

The insurgents, members of a party of political malcontents, are revolting against Iranian government authority in territory garrisoned by Soviet troops.

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Four Douglas Culprits Taken to Penitentiary

Bert Bryan Jacques, 41, and William James Dowrick, 42, sentenced last week in circuit court to 18 months each in the state penitentiary, were delivered to penitentiary authorities today by Deputy Sheriffs Al Smith and Dick Baker. Jacques and Dowrick were accused of theft of clothing and other property from an automobile at Gardiner, pleading guilty to the charge.

Also delivered to the penitentiary were Ben T. Childers, 52, Siletz Indian, who was convicted on a charge of armed assault and robbery at Reedport, sentenced to seven years, and Clayton S. Rolland, 23, who was sentenced to three years after pleading guilty to a charge of robbery from the Marcelles Pate home at Myrtle Creek.

Assembly Asks De Gaulle To Renew Coalition Try

PARIS, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The constituent assembly voted 400 to 163 today to ask Gen. De Gaulle to renew his efforts to form a coalition government giving equal representation to the communists, socialists and popular republican parties.

The communists voted as a bloc against renewal of De Gaulle's mandate in an atmosphere bristling with guns and armed guards which surrounded the Bourbon palace where the assembly met.

The vote ended temporarily at least any chance of De Gaulle's resigning as France's interim president, however.

In a last-minute switch of tactics the socialists, who had said they would abstain in the balloting, voted for De Gaulle.

Kaltenbrunner, No. 4 Nazi, Awaiting Trial, Stricken

NUERNBERG, Germany, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Ernst Kaltenbrunner, No. 4 Nazi and former chief of the Nazi security police, suffered a brain hemorrhage in his cell last night, but a spokesman for the U. S. prosecutor's office said today he would have to answer charges sometime before the international war crimes tribunal. Hospital attendants said Kaltenbrunner showed a slight improvement this morning. The defendant himself said: "I am sorry I

will be unable to face trial Tuesday."

Col. B. C. Andrus, prison commandant, said Kaltenbrunner was a "bully type" whose nerves caught up with him and reduced him to spells of weeping. Andrus added that Kaltenbrunner had been subject to spells of hysteria for several weeks.

Twenty-Nine Girls Turn Out for Rifle Practice

Twenty-nine girls turned out yesterday for the new rifle team, sponsored by the Roseburg Rod and Gun club, for High school girls. They are using the indoor range at the National Guard armory. There were 83 who signed originally as being interested, according to Bruce Yeager, secretary.

Indonesians Continue Warfare Against British

BATAVIA, Java, Nov. 19.—(AP)—An extremist Indonesian radio station called today for "war on the British" and asked Indonesian youths to reinforce the ranks of the hard-pressed native nationalists at Semarang, scene of the latest outbreak on troubled Java. A dispatch from embattled Soerabaja said the British had reported evidence that the Indonesians were endeavoring to

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manufacture bombs and weapons on a small scale there. Sporadic fighting continued in Batavia.

Possible Successor to Late Cong. Mott Listed

PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Oregonian political writer Paul Hauser today listed Eugene Marsh, McMinnville, 1945 speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives, as top candidate to fill the congressional vacancy left by the late Rep. James W. Mott. Marsh's friends "say he is re-coolative," Hauser reported. Like Mott, Marsh is a republican, known in the counties of the 1st district as any other "mentioned candidate," said Hauser. On the democratic side, Salem
