Former Roseburg Student Victim Of Plane Crash

Funeral services will be held at 1:30 P. M. Friday at Higdon's funeral parlors in Salem for Ronald Crites, U. of O. football player, who was killed Saturday in the crash of a light plane at Eugene.

Crites was a former resident of Roseburg and a brother of Gene Crites, who died in an airplane accident while completing his training for a commission with the air forces two years ago. Ronald attended grade school in Roseburg and was in Senior High school for one year prior to going to Coos Bay, where he was graduated from high school.

He served with the 15th Air Force in Italy, returning a few months ago to resume his studies at University of Oregon.

He was killed when his light plane crashed and burned, critically injuring a passenger. He had been left behind when the football team went to California, because of a broken rib suffered in a game the previous week.

He was a son of Mrs. Alameda Gering, Woodburn. A brother, Norman, now employed at Salem, recently was discharged from military service.

Dr. Charles A. Edwards and Mr. and Mrs. Roy Young are among Roseburg friends who will attend the services at Salem.

Auto Industry, Unions Face New Showdown

day to reply to the union's offer.

The action came in Detroit from delegates to the General Motors council of the CIO-UAW, representing more than 300,000 workers, and was termed by R. J. Thomas, CIO-UAW president as "not an ultimatum," but as "the last resort" to peaceful settlement.

The other main trouble spot along the nation's labor front was in Chicago while across the country some 150 labor disputes kept idle about 275,000 workers.

The strike of 8,700 telephone operators crippled long distance service in Chicago and paralyzed service in manual switchboards in 115 communities in Illinois and in two Indiana counties. A union official in New York said long lines operators throughout the country have refused to handle long distance calls to and from Chicago.

A conciliation conference, arranged by federal officials after the start of the strike Monday in a dispute over wages, failed when both company and union representatives were unable to reach agreement. The Illinois telephone traffic union is asking a \$6 week wage boost, having rejected a War Labor board award boosting wages \$4 a week.

One of the newest disputes was

reported in Salt Lake City, where freight and passenger service on the Salt Lake division of the Rio Grande Motor Way, Inc., was suspended by a strike of 60 AFL teamsters.

Fullmer H. Latter, president of the local said the walkout was in sympathy with members of the Denver local who are on strike for a 20 to 40 per cent increase in wages. He said Grand Junction, Colo., teamsters local also had joined in the strike.

Passenger service between Salt Lake City and all Colorado points and freight service between Salt Lake City and Price, Park City and Marysville, Utah, was halted by the walkouts, a company spokesman said.

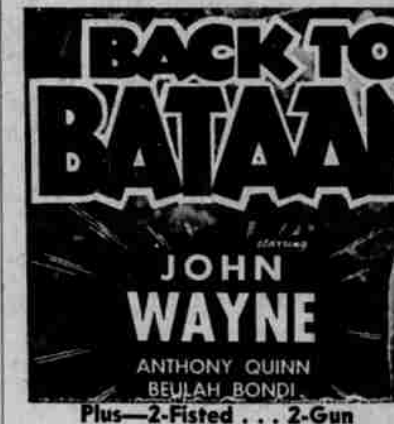
Short said, that of Stanton Black, an accident Nov. 10, on Stephens who died Nov. 14 in Mercy hospital, from injuries received in bridge.
