Sgt. Nicholas Racher
Of Days Creek Returns
FIFTH AIR FORCE SERVICE
COMMAND, OKINAWA — Staff
Sergeant Nicholas F. Racher, son
of Mrs. Mandia Racher, residing
at Days Creek, has recently been
returned to the States under the
readjustment plan.

Overseas seven months, Sgt.
Racher was an AAF supply tech-
nician with a unit of the Fifth Air

is entitled to wear the Asiatic

Seaman Wm. L. Burton

PEARL HARBOR, T. H. — Wil-
liam L. Burton, seaman, first
class, Yoncalla, Ore., and other
members of the 127th Naval con-

struction battalion have won a
commendation from the brigade

work in the Philippines when the

its climax.

Formed in September, 1943, the

tend this service.

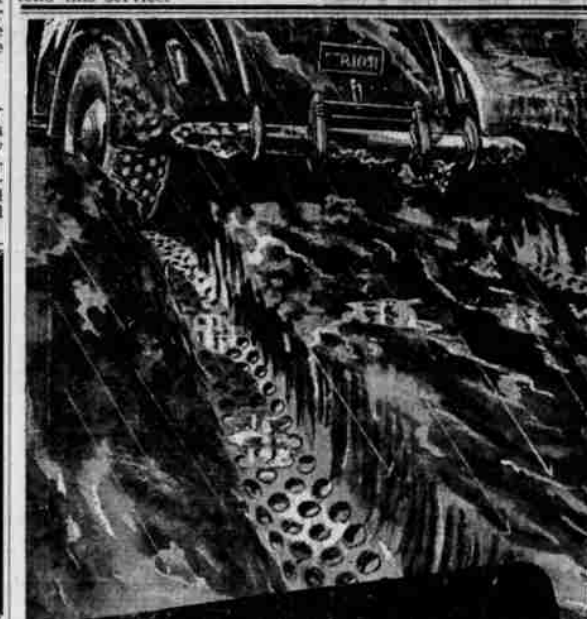
