pleted an agreement with General Zhukov for exchange press tours in the German military zones occupied by the Russians and the Americans. That is to say, we will permit the Russians to send reporters into OUR zone and the Russians will permit us to send reporters (properly chaperoned, presumably) into THEIR zone.

It isn't much, but ANY such concession on the part of the Russians is at least faintly hopeful because it indicates, even if it is in a small way, some breaking down of their very obvious suspicion of us.

ASKED if he expects any TROUBLE with Russia, Eisenhower replies:

"No, OF COURSE I don't expect any trouble with Russia. If I did, I'd want every soldier I could keep there."

That comes from Eisenhower, who is in contact with the Russians every day.

WE still seem headed for a showdown in China.

Chungking and Communist troops are reported to be staging a RACE for Changchun, capital of Manchuria, which the Russians (who took it from the Japs) appear to be slowly evacuating.

Unofficial reports in Chungking say the Russians have laid down 20 conditions (unnamed) that Chungking troops must meet before being allowed to FLY their troops in, the Chungking Chinese must move them in OVERLAND—which they seem to be starting to do. They are reported to have boomed in 23 miles from the border.

WHAT we're curious about is whether the Russians are going to BACK the Chinese Communists against Chungking. That is why we are watching all these reported developments that filter through the screens of censorship and propaganda.

THE tone of the Chinese Communists toward US is increasingly bitter. They say today we're "converting China into an American colony, similar to British imperialism in India, French imperialism in Indo-China and Dutch imperialism in the Dutch East Indies."

Reading between the lines, one guesses that their bitterness might be due to a conviction that they are LOSING OUT.

WHAT we want to know, above all else, is whether Russia will come to their aid if they ARE losing out. If that important point were not ALWAYS present in the situation, we'd figure that the solution is to let Chungking and the Northern Communists fight it out to a conclusion.

ONE can't help feeling (we are TOLD nothing) that a dangerous game is being played over there. If it should wind up with us backing Chungking and the Russians backing the Chinese Communists it would be bad. There can be no blinking that fact.

AS a related sidelight to this Chinese situation, Alex Taub, an American adviser to the China-American council, says in Portland today:

"Western industrialists should promote the industrialization of China in order to HELP BUILD INDUSTRY on our West Coast. If we begin with China now, our

ON THE PICAYUNISH SIDE

Sheldon F. Sackett, publisher of the *Cool Bay Times* has filed suits in the circuit court in Marion county questioning one, the right of State Senator Merle Chessman, Astoria, to serve as a member of the State Highway commission, and in the other, the right of Representative Earl H. Hill, Cushman, to serve on the State Fish commission. A third suit, questioning the right of Senator W. H. Strayer, Baker, to remain as a member of the State Board of Geology and Mineral Industries, is being prepared.

Publisher Sackett denies any personal motivation, other than a desire to clarify an obscure portion of the constitution. It is contended that a person holding a position in the legislative branch of government may not serve in either the executive or judicial department.

It is possible that clarification of the constitutional provision is desirable, but should it be determined that the dual capacities of the three state servants are a violation of law, the State of Oregon will suffer a distinct loss in whichever branch from which the officers withdraw.

Senator Chessman, in particular, has given most valuable service to the State of Oregon over a long period of years. Not only has he been a recognized leader in the Oregon State Senate, but he has served as a member of the fish commission and in other highly responsible positions prior to his current appointment as a member of the State Highway commission.

He is extremely sincere in his efforts to build a greater Oregon and, in his position as publisher of the *Astorian Budget* has maintained vigorous policies in favor of projects he believed to be to the state's advantage and has fought with equal vigor against those things he believed to be damaging in character. He has courageously and intelligently met opposition from pressure groups, yet has at all times maintained an attitude of fairness and open mindedness which has commanded the respect of even those with whom he has been in disagreement.

It seems extremely picayunish to question the authority of the three men named as defendants in Publisher Sackett's suits. If they were properly compensated for their services, the court action might have some dignity. But as members of the legislature they are required, as are other members of that body, to pay from their own pockets at least a portion of expenses incurred in attendance at regular sessions. As members of the executive departments in which they hold appointments, they draw only expense money which, invariably is insufficient to compensate for actual expenditures.

To risk loss of such valuable services in order to clear an obscure technicality of law seems to us to be extremely short-sighted.

Loser Wins Highest Honors

There is a lesson for all of us in the great acclaim by which General Jonathan Wainwright is being received as he tours the country in the interest of the Victory Loan campaign.

It is reported that General Wainwright grieved throughout his long period of confinement in a prisoner of war camp because he felt he would be in disgrace when he returned to the United States. He was said by war correspondents to be surprised when told he was a national hero.

Since his return to the United States he has been accorded honors equal to the great military leaders who achieved important victories. His gallant defense of Bataan and Corregidor, hopeless from the beginning, not through any fault of his but because of our own political blundering, was recognized for the stark courage which it embodied.

Perhaps nowhere in the world, except America, could a defeated general come home to the unanimous plaudits of a grateful nation, a nation which measures battles not by victory but by the courage and ability with which they are fought.

ROSEBURG GETS PAINT DONATION AFTER HARD SEARCH FOR STREET SIGN

Editor News-Review:

I am a foreigner from San Marino, California. A few days ago, when I was about to leave Portland driving south, I mentioned to Harold Cake, the purchasing agent of J. E. Haseltine and company, that I intended to stop off at Roseburg, as I had a few business calls to make.

His reply was, "You had better phone ahead to make sure of a hotel reservation because Roseburg is a thriving community and really a very busy city." I followed his recommendation and phoned Mr. J. A. Harding at the Umpqua hotel, who took very good care of me.

I arrived Friday night, November 9, in a driving rain storm. Some of your citizens will appreciate the condition of the weather that night, particularly those who attended the High school football game.

The cordiality and the generous hospitality that I received at the Umpqua hotel on my arrival was greatly appreciated. However, after checking in at the hotel I started out, to locate a friend living on Pine street. And, believe me, I should have had a radar or a seeing eye dog in trying to find Pine street.

Having a general idea of the direction in which I wanted to go, I started out, but at every street intersection I could not find any signs indicating the street that I was traveling on. Your city is a busy one and there were no places to park along the curb. Finally, I had to double park and as you know, this is dangerous as well as illegal. After double parking, I interviewed on the sidewalk several farmers and finally a Roseburg citizen, who knew how to get to Pine street.

Now please don't tell the police department I was double parking in Roseburg. Anyway, even if you do, I'll be out of the state before you get this letter.

In the next day or two I am
