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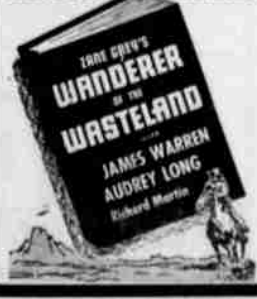

Use of DDT For Cattle Dipping Is New Probability

Extensive experiments covering the use of DDT are now being carried out by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, so that specific recommendations for its use in controlling crop pests may be available next year, and the powerful new insecticide may be used for dipping cows and spraying barns.

So says an article in the current issue of Collier's Weekly, written by Sidney Margolis, which points out the factors that must be observed by farmers and housewives in using it, including the mixtures to be used for several purposes.

"Farmers will have to wait for the results of current inquiries before they can put the new insecticide to work with full confidence," the article says. "Eventually DDT may be used for dipping cattle, for spraying barns and for possible control of the corn borer and many other plant pests."

"For spraying crops a dust or water-base spray will have to be used. Much experimental work is under way by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and no doubt specific recommendations for crop uses will be available for next year."

Caution No. 1, to farmers and housewives alike, is: "Don't spray animals with the insecticide. While there have been no established cases of poisoning by DDT, the Collier's article reports, laboratory tests show that it is possible. Where it is necessary to use an insecticide on animals, DDT dust is safer. Caution No. 2: Do not use DDT spray on tables or any surface where food is prepared for either your family, pets, or stock."

Additional Funds for Foreign Relief Approved

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The House Foreign Affairs committee today approved legislation authorizing an additional appropriation of \$1,350,000,000 for activities of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation administration—the organization set up by the United Nations to succor war-torn countries.

The committee's action followed an urgent plea last week by General of the Army Eisenhower, who praised the work of UNRRA in liberated Europe. The legislation does not appropriate any additional funds, but a separate bill carrying an appropriation is under consideration by the House Appropriations committee.

Preview of Feed Outlook For 1945-46 Offered

Here's a preview of the feed outlook for 1945-46 as compared with 1944-45. Prices of feed grains and other concentrates, except oats, probably will average about the same. Supplies of all feed concentrates per animal unit are indicated as slightly smaller than last season's large supplies. Feeding rates are likely to continue

high. The feed grains used for food and industrial purposes may be slightly less. Increased exports of some feed grains and by-products feeds are indicated. Supplies of high-protein by-product feeds, on the basis of oilmeal equivalent, probably will be slightly smaller. The supply of hay for the 1945-46 season is one of the largest on record.

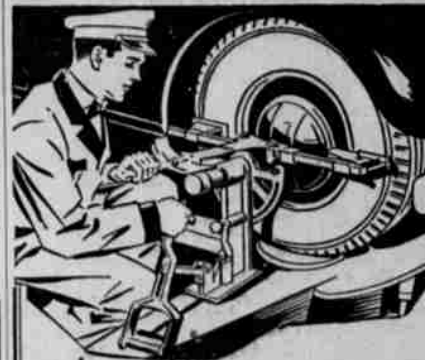
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
