years that "Papa and Mama know best what is good for you; just wait until you grow up and you'll thank us for bringing you up right."

CHILDREN, when given this perfectly sound and time-proven advice, SELDOM receive it gratefully, or even submissively. They are apt to mutter rebelliously to their teenage intimates that "Papa and Mama are old fogies who don't UNDERSTAND this generation."

Oddly enough, the children whose papas and mamas stand pat and "bring them out right" seem to turn out better in the long run than those that are turned loose on the streets to live their own lives in their own way.

That, boiled down to essentials, is the British contention as to India.

GETTING nearer home, there is a "reign of terror" in New York, where 66 violent deaths have occurred in 74 days. The largest mobile police force in the city's history, hung with guns like a division of shock troops, is patrolling the city's streets in automobiles trying to discourage indiscriminate murder.

An example of what is going on is provided by the case of a 19-year-old girl who was shot in the knee while crossing a principal downtown street. She says she was just going about her business and heard a shot and felt a sting in her leg and there she was with a knee-out of commission.

Even staid old Portland is having tavern shootings and police killings every few days.

THERE isn't any very accurate data on the subject, but great wars seem to be followed by periods of LOOSE morals on the part of considerable numbers of people. We've gone so far as to try to explain this phenomenon with big words—calling it a "war psychosis."

YOU will note that instead of TURNING THE CITY OVER to these victims of the war psychosis, New York is hiring policemen with guns. History tells us that is about the only way to handle such situations.

It is just possible that in India and the Dutch East Indies and China and elsewhere this same "war psychosis" is responsible for a lot of the trouble that is filling the front pages and clogging the air waves.

We are basically suspicious of everybody who is trying to sit on the lid in these places and appear to have a hazy notion that all revolutionists should be given a free rein. But here at home we HIRE MORE POLICEMEN.

Human beings, as has often been remarked, are funny.

DE GAULLE, who has so far succeeded in keeping his seat on the budding broncho that is present-day France, presents to the new French constituent assembly a program calling for QUICK NATIONALIZATION of credit (banking), electrical and insurance industries.

Note that in Europe "nationalization," which is a weasel word for socialism, is the remedy for every sickness that shows signs of getting chronic.

That is already plain enough to be accepted as a TREND.

THE SELFISH REASON

By Charles V. Stanton

Numerous reasons appealing to our patriotism are presented in urging us to invest our money in Victory bonds. Throughout the entire war period we have been encouraged to invest in war bonds because it was the patriotic thing to do.

Financing the war as far as possible through borrowing from the public has been and still is necessary. Consequently war bond publicity and advertising, written from the Washington angle, appeals to our patriotism.

But if we were writing Victory Loan sales copy we believe we would change the approach, stressing the purely selfish reasons which, fundamentally, motivate the great majority of individuals in buying low-cost, interest-bearing securities.

We recognize the need, of course, of financing the war. We realize that war costs have not ended simply because shooting has stopped. We know that our service men and women must be returned home, demobilized, aided in their return to civilian pursuits, and that those unfortunate ones who were incapacitated by reason of military service must be furnished with hospitalization. We undoubtedly find a measure of inspiration in these facts to stimulate our investment in war bonds.

But primarily we are concerned with our own individual welfare. We buy bonds because we know it is to our personal financial interest to do so. We know there is no better way of saving money. Many persons, who prior to the war had no systematic method of savings, have found the payroll deduction program connected with war bond sales to be the most suitable method of accumulating a financial reserve. We have talked with a great many people in the low income group who are grateful for the opportunity afforded them by the war bond program. Even though the current Victory Loan is to be the last of the special war bond sales campaigns, many people propose to maintain a program of systematic investment in federal securities.

It is surprising, as you interview war bond owners, how few propose to convert their bonds into cash ahead of maturity. The majority of those with whom we have discussed the matter propose to hold most of their bonds for the maturity period, unless some unforeseen emergency arises, and, if the opportunity still is open, will, upon cashing their mature bonds, re-invest in a similar form of security.

We find many people who have been accumulating war bonds with which to buy a home. Others have a nest egg tucked away to be used in the purchase of a new automobile. A huge market for durable goods is created by the backlog of savings in war bonds.

The war has ended, but the opportunity to accumulate savings continues. All predictions are that the period of above-normal wages will continue for several years. It is during such times that the average wage earner has opportunity to arrange financial protection for his future years if he will save and invest systematically. Through systematic investment in war bonds every wage earner can be accumulating a financial reserve for emergencies, for education of his children, for his old age.

The current Victory Loan campaign deserves our support, not alone because it is good for our country, but because it is good for each one of us individually.

I live on Smith river near Drain and as I look along the stream I find dams—two of them—with no fish ladders and no other means for fish to come up here on these streams on which we have our 80 acres.

Now would you kindly tell me how any fish could come up here into these two streams, as you know they can't climb and as they don't have any climbing hooks. And as to game wardens, so far as I or any other of us newcomers are concerned, we have not seen one nor do we know what he looks like. I wonder if the fish and game commission has any interest up and around this part of the country. I am 100 per cent for this beautiful state and I for one would like to see something done about

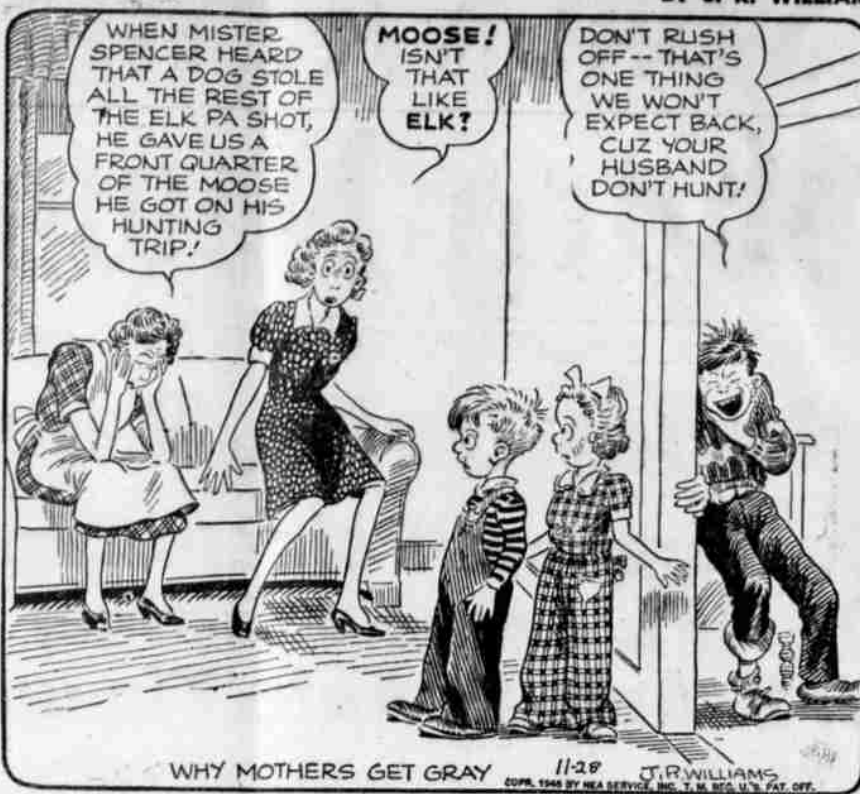

Oakland, Sutherlin Buy Tract for Garbage Dump

SUTHERLIN—Acquisition of a tract of land from Frances Todd, located east of Oakland, to be used jointly by Oakland and Sutherlin as a garbage dump, is being negotiated by the Sutherlin city council. A ten-year lease is being prepared and arrangements call for costs of rental and road upkeep to be shared by the two towns. Garbage disposal has been a major problem for both Sutherlin and Oakland in recent years, due largely to inability to obtain land which would meet approval of the state board of health. Floyd Porter of Sutherlin is to operate the garbage collection business for both towns.

Air Medal Awarded to Lieut. Paul J. Ploss

PORTLAND, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Modern cattle rustlers have plenty of nerve, Roy D. Larsen, investigator for the State Department of Agriculture, declared yesterday.

He reported the theft of a 2,000-pound registered shorthorn bull from the S. F. Gaulke farm at Brightwood. The owner didn't know his bull was stolen until a neighbor asked him if it had been sold, Larsen said.

State police and Larsen are helping the Clackamas county sheriff's office investigate.

Oregon Slayer's Wife Files Suit for Divorce

PORTLAND, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Berdette H. Davis has filed suit for divorce from Andrew W. Dennis, whose execution for murder of his mother-in-law has been stayed by a court order.

Mrs. Dennis, who charged her husband with cruel and inhuman treatment, said he attacked her in a drunken rage and that she feared for her life while they were married.

Traffic Tragedy Brings Homicide Accusation

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Police today held Michael Foley, 40, on a charge of

negligent homicide, after a week-end traffic accident which brought death to Johnny Spicer, 37.

Spicer was crushed between Foley's car and a pickup truck, city police reported. He was standing at the rear of the truck, Paul Hendron, Chilquin, who was attempting to crank the truck, was injured when he was knocked down by the impact of the crash.
