Noted Dance Band Headed By Eddie Miller to Play At Armory in Roseburg



Eddie Miller (above) and his noted dance band will be in Roseburg Wednesday, Nov. 28, and will play for dancing at the Roseburg Armory from 9 P. M. to 1 A. M. Featured by the orchestra, in addition to its noted leader, will be Penny Parker, vocalist; Nappy Lamare, guitar; Doc Rondo, sax; Nick Patool, drums.

Miller, now one of the best known among dance band leaders, started his career in music at the age of 13 years, when he took a paper route in order to become a member of a newsboys' band in his home town of New Orleans.

He had his first professional band job at the age of 14 years, and at 15 spent so much time playing at night clubs that he collapsed one day in the school room and was ordered to choose between education and jazz. Jazz won and the Miller name is now well known to radio and motion picture fans, as well as in famous ballrooms throughout the country.

Japanese Continue Fight for Independence

the camp and its 10,000 civilian inmates to retire within the camp area for the night.

The British yesterday sent three mosquito bombers into the battle for Ambarawa and the planes, using machineguns and cannon, strafed troop concentrations and attacked warehouses and transport columns.

In Bandoeng a British company returning from the airfield area was overruled and believed to have been held up by roadblocks.

Aron Gutwirth, local chairman for the Netherlands East Indies Red Cross, said when the mass evacuation petition was presented to the government, that "people are disappearing daily. We never hear of them again. The people are living in terror."

American Aid Asked
Gutwirth also voiced a special appeal to America for aid. "We appeal especially to America, which is one of the few countries that didn't suffer from an invasion. We appeal to America to send us ships and other help in getting these people away, and to all Americans to grant us hospitality until times become normal here again."

Meanwhile, the Indonesian National committee, meeting in Batavia, adopted a resolution asking "all peoples of the earth who believe in justice to give all moral and material support to the people of Indonesia in their fight for independence, so that the British may be restrained from converting Indonesia into another Manchuria for the benefit of the Dutch."

In Moscow last night a radio commentator in an English-language broadcast accused the British of breaking a promise in using troops "to crush the local movement of liberation in Indonesia."

"The commentator said the British authorities declared their objective was to disarm and evacuate Japanese troops and not to interfere with internal affairs, 'but they are now fighting battles' and Netherlands authorities 'are banking on restoring their prewar domination.'"

First Buyers Of Christmas Seals, Bond Are Named

Walter Cloake, superintendent of the Medical Arts building, was the first purchaser of Christmas seals again this year, according to an announcement by the executive secretary of the Douglas Public Health association, Mrs. W. F. Amiot, and Horace DeBernard, owner of Dob's Market, was the first to purchase the Christmas seal bond.

Mrs. R. M. Church, chairman of the seal sale for 1945, reports that returns are coming in more promptly this year than in previous years and that the citizens of Douglas county have been most cooperative and generous in response to the seal sale appeal.
