U. S. Slashes Wool Sale Price to Meet Foreign Figures

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The government yesterday reduced the selling prices of its wool by an average of seven cents a pound, grease basis, to encourage greater use by domestic manufacturers.

Little domestic wool has been moving into use because foreign wools have been priced cheaper. The government owns 421,000,000 pounds of domestic wool, acquired under wartime programs designed to support grower prices at levels which would encourage production.

Handlers are authorized to sell government holdings of either shorn or pulled wool at prices set forth in a revised schedule of selling prices, which, for all grades and classes of wool, average about seven cents per pound lower than under the past schedule.

On a grease basis (raw wool) the selling price will now average about 39 cents a pound compared with a previous price of about 46 cents. On wool sold on a clean basis (washed and combed), the reduction is between 15 and 16 cents a pound.

The department said sales will be made only to processors and semi-processors. Sales will be made on the basis of past appraisals. The department said no reappraisals will be made of wool sold at the revised prices. The department said that the government will continue to purchase 1945-crop wool from growers at previously announced support prices.

Contract for Mail Carrying Awarded

D. A. Stewart, Route 1, Roseburg, will carry mail on the Idleyd star route under a temporary contract ending June 30, 1946, it was announced by L. L. Wimberly, postmaster, today.

A change in previously published information on regulations for mailing parcels to armed forces overseas was noted by Wimberly. While the permissible size of packages to Army troops has been increased to 11 pounds in weight, 42 inches in length, and girth and combined, packages for Navy personnel overseas still must not exceed five pounds in weight, nor 36 inches in length and girth combined.

The Christmas deadline for mailing parcels to Army troops has passed. Packages for Army personnel overseas can not now be mailed without personal requests from the soldiers themselves. Such requests are not required for the Navy.

Stamp sales and volume of mail in the Roseburg postoffice are approximately one-third more
