Because of the large crop this year, the department hopes growers will offer potatoes liberally throughout the marketing season. They are not being encouraged to hold back the crop until early spring, as last year.

Seaman's Death Under Inquiry by Kansas Governor

TOPEKA, Kas., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Gov. Andrew Schoepel disclosed today that he is investigating circumstances surrounding the death of Merchant Seaman Rodney M. Sanborn, 23, and charges made by Sanborn's father that the body was returned to him nude, mutilated and unattended.

Letters from the father, Guy F. Sanborn, Wichita, Kas., to Governor Schoepel, and which were made public by the governor, related this story:

Sanborn's body was returned to his father with deep incisions in the skull and none of them had been sewed. No information was forthcoming as to the cause of death except that it occurred on shipboard and the nature of the accident could not be discussed as it was a military secret.

Two letters were received from St. Elizabeth's hospital in Washington, one of which attributed young Sanborn's death to infection in injuries in both knees, and the other saying it was due to an infection in an arm injury. Despite these letters, Sanborn said, an autopsy which he authorized was performed mainly on the head and face.

In Washington, Dr. S. A. Silk, assistant superintendent of St. Elizabeth's hospital told reporters Sanborn was admitted August 28, 1944 and died last October 25 of heart disease.

Dr. Silk said the family and the Red Cross were notified of the death and the father authorized an autopsy. This was performed, Dr. Silk said, by a competent pathologist and the body left the hospital in good condition.

Foreign Demands for Legume Seed Increase

Foreign needs for legume and grass seeds have increased since the crop has begun to move to market. Most war-torn countries look to the U. S. to supply them with seed to provide feed for rebuilding livestock production. Heavy demand for most seeds is bringing high prices to growers. Under the government's special 1945 seed program, farmers became eligible for acreage payments after harvesting alfalfa, clover, and red clover seed.

When the seed is sold into commercial channels before December 31, 1945, although the harvest was late, 54 per cent of the commercial crop of alfalfa clover has been sold to dealers. Movement to dealers of red clover seed is faster than usual and about 40 per cent of the commercial crop has been sold by growers. The Netherlands, Great Britain, and Belgium have requested shipments of red clover seed from the U. S. This particular clover grows well on once-flooded Dutch lands. By mid-October, 54 per

Low-Point Gridsters Win Army Discharges, Claim

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—(AP)—The Army has asked its commander in Hawaii for a report on the asserted return of 54 football players to the United States by air although they had too few points to be discharged.

An editorial in Stars and Stripes, Army newspaper, said only 13 of the 54, all of whom were members of the Army air forces Hawaiian flyers team, would qualify for release even under the reduced score of 55 points which will go into effect soon.

Next year in counties where the new plan is approved, farmers will obtain their conservation material phosphate from dealers instead of from the county association. Under this plan a farmer will obtain a purchase order in the amount of his expected practice payment for applying the phosphate. He will take the order to a dealer, take delivery of the phosphate, and pay the dealer the difference between the amount of the purchase order and the established fair price for the county, or the amount of the order and the dealer's price if it is less than the fair price.

Dealers to Handle AAA Materials

The purchase order method of distributing conservation materials to Oregon farmers has been inaugurated for 1946, with "fair prices" for superphosphate approved for eight Oregon counties, R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee, has announced.

The purchase order plan, Taylor explained, replaces direct distribution by county agricultural conservation associations of phosphate shipped in from plants under contract to AAA. Through the contract plan, since 1939, 10,650 tons of treble phosphate and 22,100 tons of superphosphate have been distributed to Oregon farmers for use on soil-conserving crops.

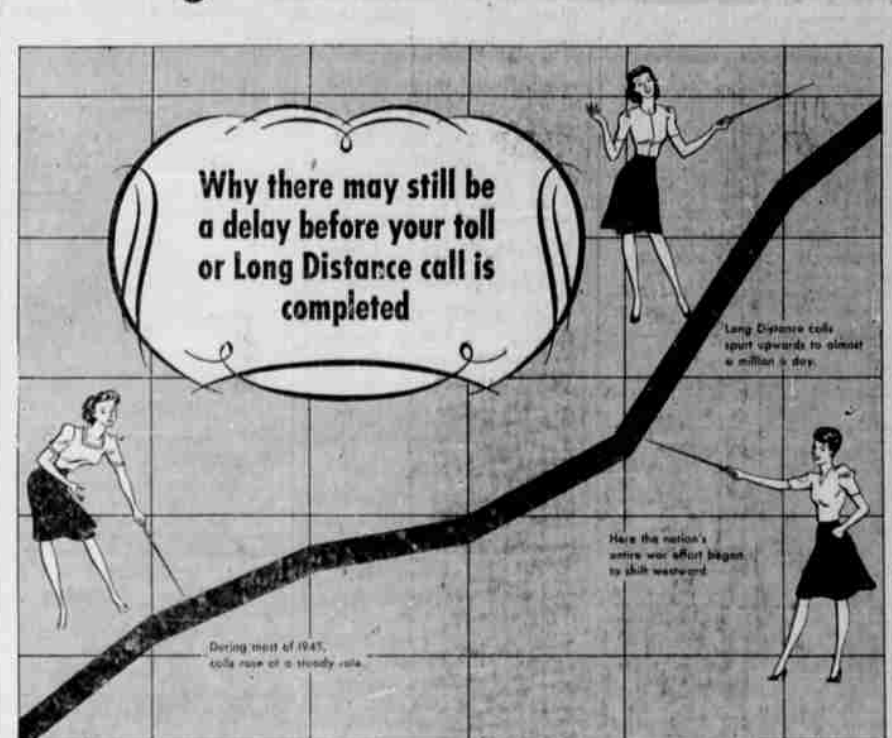
