

Concert of R. H. S. Band, Chorus Best Of Kind, Verdict

An audience which filled the Senior High school gymnasium to capacity Friday night heard a most enjoyable concert presented by the combined school band and chorus. The program was pronounced by listeners by far the best of its kind ever presented in the Roseburg schools, both from the standpoint of the number of participating students and the high quality of music and expert rendition.

Included were two groups of selections by the band, numbers by the advanced chorus of girls, the combined girls chorus of 35 voices, the boys chorus of 25 voices and a mixed chorus of 21 voices.

In addition to the group numbers, the program included vocal duets by Betty Sanders and Wayne Wagner, and whistling solos by Pat Gray.

The concert ended with an ensemble of band and combined chorus — 225 students — playing and singing a medley of Christmas carols.

The program was under the direction of Les Irvin, music instructor. Georgene Shanklin and Pat Lamm, pianists, were accompanists, with Mr. Irvin at the piano for the groups by the boys chorus. Dawn Lillard was assistant director for the ensemble group.

Proceeds will be used in purchasing instruments needed to complete the band's instrumentation.

bility that good's are being withheld is John D. Small, head of the Civilian Production administration.

This agency has been making an investigation of manufacturers' inventories, but thus far has reported no evidence of any hoarding of merchandise.

Price Boost at Issue

Aside from the tax motive, Bowles asserted flatly that processors of cotton fabric for clothing "have been holding up deliveries" while waiting for OPA to decide whether they are entitled to price increases.

Bowles acknowledged there has been a delay on this decision, but he said that "for a long time we were unable to get (processors') figures." He promised a ruling soon.

Bowles also gave his reasons why OPA has been unable to reduce clothing prices six to seven per cent this year, a goal set by the agency last spring.

gaining and nation-wide wage increases.

While labor disagreed, the management delegation voted against both resolutions and stuck to one of its own saying that wage levels were not the conference's business. In the end, no resolution was adopted, not even the portions endorsing collective bargaining which all had contained.

The conference closed in disagreement on three major subjects, half its agenda. The split recommendations were on collective bargaining and observance of contracts, on management's right to manage, and on jurisdictional disputes.

Arbitration Agreed On Its chief accomplishment, in the view of most leaders, was agreement that arbitration or umpireship, instead of strikes and lockouts, should be the final word in grievances arising under existing labor contracts. This was one of three reports agreed on.

Another was that the U. S. conciliation service should be strengthened, with an advisory committee representing labor and management.

The delegates also approved a permanent panel of top industry and labor leaders, to continue the quest for labor harmony.

The meeting failed to produce any new machinery, however, such as voluntary arbitration or impartial fact-finding, for the peaceful settlement of present strikes or future stoppages growing out of labor's demand for new contracts carrying higher wages to replace loss of wartime overtime earnings.

Hess Enjoys Duplicité

The one-time Nazi glamour boy and deputy to Adolf Hitler, who became one of the war's mystery men after he parachuted into Scotland in the early summer of 1941, had hardly left the international tribunal's presence yesterday when he began boasting that he had made psychiatrists of four nations "look ridiculous."

Hess, aide to Hitler in the writing of "Mein Kampf" and once second only to Reichsmarschal Hermann Goering in the line of success to the fuhrer, appeared to love the spotlight which switched suddenly to him after his startling announcement.

Maj. Douglas Kelley, a San Francisco psychiatrist who had examined Hess, gave this interpretation of the gaunt defendant's announcement:

"Hess' action was a return to the typical hysterical personality he has constantly manifested. His amnesia was a deliberate simulation."

"Undoubtedly, after years of practice in a purposeful forgetting in England, he is unable to recall certain events of the past, but it is obvious he has been using amnesia as a defense."

Execution Expected

Kelley suggested that Hess' outburst may have been inspired by the presence of Justice Robert H. Jackson, the American chief prosecutor, throughout yesterday's session, for Hess is believed suffering from a "conscious malignity" toward Jackson.

Hess' Counsel, Gunther von Rohrscheidt, disclosed that Hess had prepared a statement for the court and press to be released today. Von Rohrscheidt also said that Hess made it plain that he "expects to be executed."

Hess Creates Laughter

Hess today amused his fellow Nazi defendants with his tale of faking amnesia before the world.

Hess had Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz and Erich Raeder shaking with laughter before the court session opened when he told them how he pretended loss of memory and partial insanity. All other defendants were absent yesterday when Hess made his sensational confession and most of them were convulsed with laughter when they learned of it for the first time today.

Hess boasted of his skilled navigation on his mysterious flight to Britain four years ago when questioned briefly in his cell before the trial by Maj. Douglas Kelley, U. S. Army psychiatrist.

He confirmed reports that he had left a note to Hitler telling him he was going to appeal for peace in the hope of what he called saving civilization from bolshevism. He told Kelley he wanted to make a direct appeal to Britain's king, to help stop the war.

Parachutes Sighted in Trees Spur Search for Three Missing Airmen

Searching parties are setting out on horseback from the Ernest Short place at Tye to investigate two parachutes seen yesterday in the tops of fir trees near Pleasant creek, on the shoulder of Old Blue mountain. The parachutes were seen by Howard Church, observer in the plane piloted by George Felt of the Roseburg airport, who is carrying on aerial reconnaissance in the search for the three remaining men of missing bomber crew.

State Police Officers Dick Miles and Clyde Flisk, from Reedsport, are with the searching party setting out from Tye, it was reported by Fred Southwick, supervising warden of the Douglas Forest Protective association.

The planes from Roseburg joined the search in the area of the Douglas-Coos boundary. This week, on the theory that the missing men, if they survived the crash, may have looked toward Douglas county.

Russians Evacuating Teheran in Surprise Act

TEHERAN, Iran, Nov. 30.—(Delayed)—The Russians began carrying out a surprise evacuation of Teheran last night.

The governor of Azerbaijan, appointed recently by the central Iranian government, arrived in the provincial capital of Tabriz today from Teheran in a plane put at his disposal by Soviet authorities.

A Russian note denied that Russia was intervening in the political or economic affairs of Iran.
