Lynam, Achiu Win Team Tilt; Mask Beats Mystery X

The teamwork of Joe Lynam and Walter Achiu was too much for their opponent, Buck Davidson and Earl Malone, the latter a paunchy Texas hombre making his first appearance here, on the headline of last Saturday night's wrestling card at the Roseburg armory. The losers, however, got the first fall in 12:33, chiefly by dint of unorthodox tactics. But they were bottled much on their own term in the succeeding two rounds, losing the second fall in 14:44 and the third and final in 9:38.

In the last bit of action that decided the combat, Achiu and Lynam each simultaneously got their opponents in a headlock on opposite sides of the ring. Then, rushing toward each other, they rammed Malone's and Davidson's heads together and put them down for easy falls. Mentally muddled from the cranial collision, Malone, upon regaining his feet, evidently didn't realize the match was ended and tied into his own partner, Davidson, with his fists. Buck retaliated until Referee Owen intervened and restored peace.

Mask Conquers Mr. X
In the semi-final, the Grey Mask defeated his hooded rival, Mysterious Mr. X, two out of three falls, but the loser on several occasions forced the Mask to save himself by either clinging to the ropes or crawling under them. Victory came to the Mask as usual via his head-butts, followed by the Boston crab hold. He took the first fall in 14:40 and the third in 8:32. Mr. X registered the fall in the second round in 7:22 with a full length, head-first body whipl, followed by a crotch-and-shoulder slam. He repeated the whipl in the final round but was unable to follow up the advantage effectively.

The crowd in attendance was one of the season's largest, estimated at around 1,100. This week's card will take place next Friday instead of on the usual date of Saturday. The Turkey show management takes over the armory on Saturday to prepare the setting for the four-day Turkey show opening the following Monday.

Grant Wins Grid Crown By Beating Hood River

PORTLAND, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The Grant Generals held Oregon's state prep grid crown for the second time in three years today after shutting out the Hood River Dragons 13-0 here Saturday in the class "A" 1945 title classic. Sparked by left halfback Gerry Smith, Grant bottled up the Dragons in their own territory, allowing the highly touted Hood

River boys only 15 yards net gain by rushing and 52 yards on 14 completed passes.

Trojans Defeat UCLA, Named to Rose Bowl Tilt

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 3.—(AP)—It's Southern California—for the ninth time and third in a row—in the Rose Bowl against Alabama Jan. 1.

The Trojans were the unanimous bowl choice of the Pacific Coast conference after their smashing 26-15 win Saturday over UCLA Bruins. The win, more convincing than the 13-6 decision USC took earlier this season from the Bruins, gave the Trojans their 10th victory in the 15-game series. The hapless Bruins have won only one. Four were tied. Alabama wound up its campaign Saturday unbeaten and untied by slaughtering Mississippi State 55-13.

The ranking form reversal of the weekend saw Great Lakes' Sailors mow down Notre Dame 39-7 while California staged another surprise by beating St. Mary's Pre-flight 6-0. Yale won the "Big Three" championship as Art Fitzgerald, a former Notre Dame scrub, scored three touchdowns to lead the Elis to a 28-0 victory over Harvard.

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George McFarland Sees Service on Two Oceans

PEARL HARBOR—George R. McFarland, motor machinist's mate, first class, 520 Mill St., Roseburg, Ore., and shipmates assisted in the formal occupation of Japan and is currently on duty in the Guam area, an analysis of Naval personnel distribution reveals.

He served aboard the PC-1251, anti-submarine ship, which went into action in February, 1943, in the Atlantic, and in that favorite hunting ground of U-boats, the Guantánamo-Aruba-Trinidad area. When the Atlantic sub menace was eliminated, the PC was ordered to the Pacific, and at the

end of the war he and his vessel were in Leyte to hear the news of the surrender.

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
