take in American foreign policy the people will do the bulk of the fighting, the suffering and the dying.)

DIPLOMACY, traditionally secret, grew up in the days of "divine right" kings who ruled with despotic power. Foreign policy was then a GAME in which the common people had no say. They'd have been put in their place quickly enough if they had tried to butt in on what was regarded as the exclusive business of their betters.

(Their PLACE would have been a deep dungeon.)

MUCH of the world (NOTABLY AMERICA) has changed since then. The spread of education has made the PEOPLE of enlightened countries, such as ours, competent to judge as to the rightness or the wrongness of our basic relations with other peoples.

The trouble is that while the world has changed DIPLOMACY HASN'T. In most of the world's capitals, the conduct of foreign affairs is still looked upon as the exclusive prerogative of the silk-hatted professionals.

If you want a good grounding in the traditional principles of diplomacy (which deals with foreign "policy") read Machiavelli's "The Prince." (You can get a copy of it at the public library.) Machiavelli was a cynical Florentine who lived and wrote some 400 years ago. The fundamental principles of diplomacy, as practiced by the professionals, haven't changed much since then.

AS to "foreign policy," the Chungking government announces that Russia has agreed to delay withdrawal of her troops from Manchuria until January 3, enabling Chungking personnel to take over Manchuria's administration and permitting Chungking troops to move in before the Russian withdrawal is completed.

It was for this purpose, Chungking says, that the date of Russian withdrawal was changed. The Russians had been scheduled to leave Manchuria by December 3, but Chiang Kai-Shek feared that Chinese communists (who seem to be as thick as fleas in Manchuria) would ASSUME CONTROL if the Russian forces evacuated the country so soon.

THE whole Chinese business, as outlined by this (censored, of course) dispatch SOUNDS as if Russia is proceeding in good faith according to an agreement already arrived at. The agreement, presumably, would permit Chungking to handle the communists—if it can.

We must remember, however, that these foreign policy doings seldom turn out to be what on the surface they SEEM to be.

THAT labor-management conference comes to a close. A Washington dispatch says: "Its chief accomplishment, in the view of most leaders, was agreement that arbitration or impromptu strikes and lockouts should be the final word in disputes arising under EXISTING labor contracts."

THE real accomplishment is to be found in the fact that the conference didn't break up in a row. If labor and management learn by experience that they can get together and talk things over without a fight, it will be evident that we are making progress toward common sense handling of

LOOP SERVICE NEEDED

The Pacific Greyhound Lines will sponsor formal opening tonight of facilities recently constructed and installed in Roseburg. The new depot has been in use for several weeks, but public dedication was delayed because of the strike of bus drivers.

Roseburg's Greyhound terminal is one of the finest and most modern on the entire system. It incorporates plans of stage line officials for postwar service and was built with a view of handling greatly expanded transportation demands.

One cannot help but recall, as public inspection of the new quarters is in progress, the problems which have been eliminated. Through new facilities and ample, covered loading and unloading platforms, obstruction of traffic, damage to streets, curbside parking and other handicaps and hazards have been removed. Constant friction between city and stage line officials has been changed to a spirit of friendly cooperation.

The Pacific Greyhound Lines are entitled to commendation and congratulation on their new quarters and to appreciation for cooperation in city improvement. At the same time, the Coen Lumber company is deserving of a big hand for excellence of construction.

Roseburg and all other Douglas county communities have been enjoying unparalleled expansion and the new Greyhound facilities are in keeping with the progressive trend.

While company officials are in Roseburg today we hope they will investigate the possibilities for a loop service to include Roseburg, Coos Bay, Reedsport and Drain and intermediate points. We have commented previously on the need for this service and the possibilities it offers for profitable operation. Because of demand for better transportation between inland and coastal points, the company is operating a daily bus between Reedsport and Roseburg. In actual practice, however, this schedule benefits only the population of Reedsport and points between Reedsport and Drain. Due to the limited number of persons to be served, travel has been light, despite a sincere and aggressive effort on the part of both Roseburg and Reedsport to promote use of the service.

A population of about 3,000 people is tributary to this special schedule. But a population well in excess of 30,000, or ten times as many people, could be served by a loop service.

Transportation facilities between inland and coast points will be more and more in demand in forthcoming years. Ports of Coos Bay and the Umpqua are to be developed for deep water shipping. We must have improved highways, on the most direct routes, to facilitate hauling of heavy loads. Related business between coastal and inland towns will enforce increased travel. These changes will require improvement in public transportation. We believe the business now is available and service should be provided at the earliest possible date.

While we appreciate Greyhound's new line between Reedsport and Roseburg, we feel that a more adequate and profitable set-up is possible through organization of a loop schedule, which would be of benefit both to the communities served and the company. We hope the project will receive deserved attention and study.

THERE is much TALK about collective bargaining.

Collective bargaining won't be a success until it results in contracts, arrived at by negotiation and reasonably fair to BOTH parties, backed by full financial responsibility on both sides and enforceable in the courts, the same as any other business contract.

BUSINESS generally has LONG accepted the courts as arbiters of business contracts. Business also long since accepted the principle that the POLICE WOULD INTERFERE if during the ordinary negotiation of a business contract one party tried by force to shut up the other's establishment.

After all, collective bargaining is a PLAIN BUSINESS TRANSACTION, and until we begin to look upon it as such and cease to look upon it as a costly but inevitable form of guerrilla warfare we won't get very far in the way of a solution.

Dr. Thomas Hunt, Noted Heredity Authority, Dies

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Death has claimed Dr. Thomas Hunt Morgan, regarded by many men of science as the world's foremost authority on heredity.

The 79-year-old winner of the 1933 Nobel prize for medicine succumbed yesterday after a short illness.

Dr. Morgan was the first winner of the Nobel prize in medicine who was not a physician. He won the prize for clarifying the laws of heredity and mutation of species after 17 years' study of his vinegar flies.

Dr. Morgan was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1888. His widow and five children survive him.

Pay Differences Will Be Adjusted

An adjustment soon of the two-and-a-half cents difference in pay between CIO and AFL lumber and sawmill workers, was seen here today by D. C. Kingsford, business agent of the IWA-CIO.

Kingsford said he could not tell when the adjustment would be made, but was sure the CIO pay would be reconciled, soon, with those of AFL workers.

Local 7-307, IWA-CIO, has signed contracts with the Jackson Creek Logging company at Myrtle Creek, and the Bailey Manufacturing company here. Kingsford also announced.

"They are two of the best contracts ever signed," he said, "with union and management both well taken care of."

Wage adjustments have been made with the Eugene Plywood company, in the pay of fallers. An increase of five cents over the previous base of 70 cents for each 1,000 log feet was made, Kingsford reported.

Alaskan Mail Flier Crashes, Feared Dead

NOME, Alaska, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Army planes and local fliers searching for Pilot Don George of Ferguson Airways at Kotzebue, whose last radioed words to his home base were "I don't know where I am, I have to go down."

George, flying with a mail load, messaged last Wednesday that he was off his course and thought he was about two hours flying time north of Nome.

Later Pilot Gene Jack of Kotzebue radioed he had sighted the wreckage on the side of a hill and the plane was so badly wrecked there probably was no chance George was still alive. He had been on the direct course between Deering and Candle and a few more minutes' flight would have taken him to a safe landing on level sea ice.

Search parties were to attempt to reach the scene today.

Senator Wants No Russian Satellite Role for Germany

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Senator Eastland (D., Miss.) said yesterday the western powers "cannot permit" Germany to become a satellite of Russia, which he termed a "predatory aggressor nation."

Speaking in the Senate, Eastland said:

"The Communists know that a hungry chaotic Germany will and must embrace Communism and that a Soviet Germany would lead to the sovietizing of the smaller nations of Western Europe and the collapse of democracy outside Britain and the United States."

"Whether we like it or not, Germany is the keystone of the structure and Germany in Europe must be kept by all means within the folds of democratic, freedom-loving Christian people who follow the private enterprise system."

Eastland said the de-industrialization of Germany would deprive the United States of one of its greatest foreign markets.

The senator offered four specific recommendations:

1. Repudiation of the doctrine of "collective guilt" of the German people.
2. The U. S. to demand that the "starvation rations" of the German people be increased, with a separate American relief machine to be set up.
3. Reunion of the four German zones under a central, non-Nazi civil administration.
4. End "scorched earth" reparations policies and set German peacetime industry in motion.

Sustained Timber Yield Plan Praised By Senator Cordon

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Characterized as one of the most important hearings ever held in Oregon by Senator Guy Cordon of Oregon, the hearing on cooperative sustained yield forest management for the Northwest opened here yesterday under the direction of the Department of Interior.

Cordon said the plan is an opportunity for private owners to combine their lands with public lands of the O. and C. administration in an effort to assure a backlog of timber forever. Reason for the hearing is to combat the possibility that unsupervised cutting will eventually wipe out the nation's last great stand of timber.

Cordon said, "We have here what appears to be the best opportunity private ownership will ever have to experiment and determine whether sustained yield can be worked out as a profitable, commercial program."

More than 300 lumbermen were in attendance at the initial session of the hearing. Walter Horning, chief forester of the O. and C. land administration, outlined details of the program for the proposed master unit in the Siuslaw area of Lane county. He said 41.3 per cent of this timber is merchantable, 21.7 per cent second growth, 12.2 per cent in the reproduction stage, and 21.7 per cent is classed as a reforestation area. On all lands in this master unit there is an allowable cut of 130,000,000 feet annually and a potential cut of 155,000,000 feet, he pointed out.

State Forester N. S. Rogers said the state is desirous of cooperating in any program to stabilize economy, but said the law requires hearings before state lands are included in such programs.

A-Bomb Secrecy Decried by Labor Leader of Britain

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Harold J. Laski, chairman of the British labor party, says no nation "is fit to be trusted with the development of atomic energy."

"Every implication of this discovery means planned internationalism—economic, social, political," Laski told a forum here. As he spoke Catholic pickets paraded outside the building carrying signs which read: "Franco saved Spain from the Reds, Mr. Laski" and "oust Laski, the anti-Catholic hate monger."

Laski said one of the "major pre-occupations of the great vested interests is how to keep the (atomic) 'secret'—which is no

secret—from the knowledge of Russia." "You know the result," he added, "a halt to confidence and the rise of ugly suspicion about the imminent chances of a third world war."

Laski said free enterprise economies should be scrapped because, he declared, they lead to war which in the atomic age would destroy civilization.

"There is no middle way," he said. "Free enterprise and the market economy mean war; socialism and planned economy mean peace. All attempts to find a compromise are a satanic illusion. We must plan our civilization or we must perish."

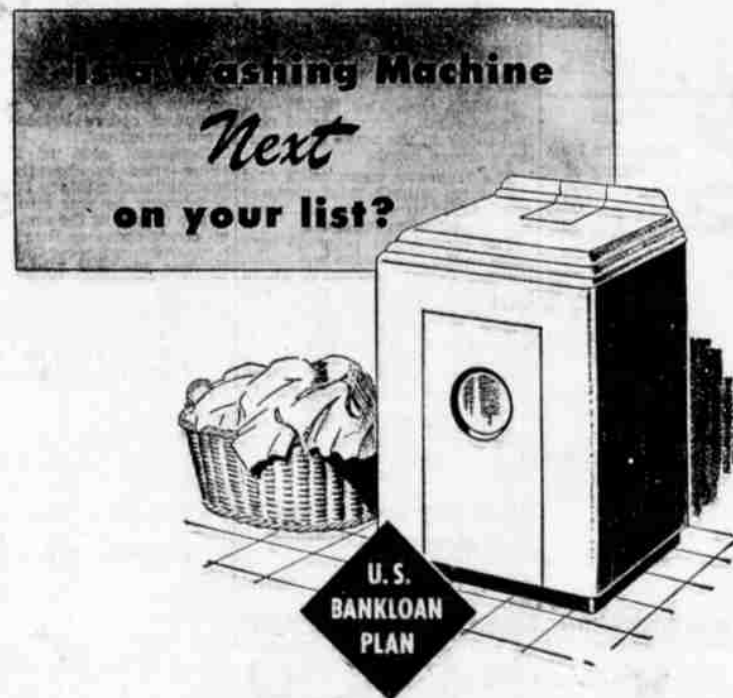
