He is a native of Providence, R. I., and has a long record in the diplomatic service. He served in London during most of the war as charge d'affaires to the governments-in-exile.

## Threat of Chaos In Soaring Values Seen by Realtor

Fear that inflated real estate values in Roseburg now will cause economic disruption two or three years hence, was expressed by Charles M. Emery, local realtor and insurance man, who saw a similar chaos in Eugene following the last war.

The housing situation in Roseburg today couldn't be blacker if it were draped in funeral crepe, he commented, to point his argument.

A difference between Eugene then and Roseburg now, Emery pointed out, was that houses were to be had during the period of the war, then became scarce in a wild scramble for real estate as veterans returned home. This time houses have been scarce all through the war.

When the veterans came home the last time, they received loans from the State, similar to the GI loans of this war. Real estate prices boomed and housing became scarce as the veterans paid atrocious prices for what they could get.

As soon as materials became available, new houses were built, and sold for less than the older houses cost. The veterans sold their equities in their old houses for less than their investment, in order to get new housing. Emery said, it was not long before 300 of the old houses were off the tax rolls because their tenants could no longer afford to keep up payments on their loans while newer houses on the market cost so much less.

Veterans' loans are not easily made this time, despite popular belief. Yet with the combination of a giant industry thrust on this little town, and all the soldiers returning from the war, real estate men and property owners have been quick to take advantage of the tremendous demand for housing. They will be sorry

for it later, is Emery's belief. Prices here will drop as soon as new building gets under way. It may be two years, Emery predicted. The town will suffer as a result of the excessive prices now being paid, and only the tremendous shortage of houses now will postpone the trouble.
