

Joe Louis Dated For Boxing Bout At Eugene Dec. 12

EUGENE, Dec. 6.—(Special)—The greatest sports extravaganza ever held in Oregon outside of Portland will be staged here at McArthur court Wednesday night, December 12, when Joe Louis meets an unnamed opponent in a four-round boxing bout. The world heavyweight champion will be making his final public appearance before meeting the challenge of Billy Conn in a \$3,000,000 title tilt.

Eugene will become the only community outside of a Pacific coast metropolitan area in which Louis will appear during his current "training tour." Promoter Don Owen, who outbid Victoria, B. C., for Louis' appearance, was forced to guarantee the "Brown Bomber" \$6,000 plus expense, but gained an important point in insisting that Louis meet a hand-picked opponent instead of the customary sparring partner. Owen said today that he has offered \$2,500 to Buddy Baer, the heavyweight who dropped a seven-round technical decision to Louis in May, 1941, in a Washington, D. C., title match.

Two six-round boxing bouts and two top-notch wrestling matches will support the show. Jack Dempsey, during his comeback tour in 1931, attracted 10,000 fans to the same University of Oregon basketball pavilion, and Owen anticipates an equally large crowd.

Because of the large guarantee and the heavy overhead, Owen has been forced to set admission prices higher than usual.

The money will be used to purchase canned goods in case lots to be shipped to the UNRRA headquarters in New York. At a meeting of the Woman's club Tuesday, contributions given by members made it possible to purchase three cases of canned goods.

Marine Enlistments Cut to Two-Year Hitch

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—(AP)—For the first time in 25 years the Marine corps has opened its ranks to youths who want to limit their hitch to two years.

Men 17 to 25 years old will be accepted without prior military service. Those 26 to 31 who have been in the forces within a year may re-enlist. If they sign up after 90 or fewer days as civilians they will receive their old rank, the Marine corps announced.

Enlistments also will be accepted for the three and four-year terms which have been the rule since 1920.
