

Regional Meet Dated Here By WCTU Officers

Toose, president of the Oregon Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and four other state officers will be in Roseburg at the Christian church on Dec. 11 and 12 to conduct a state-county workshop with instructions in the latest accomplishments and plans of procedure of the National Temperance organizations.

Delegates from Klamath, Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Douglas counties will be in attendance. The history of the WCTU and the temperance movement will be given by Mrs. Toose at the opening session, and state and National news will be presented by Mrs. Winona Horton, editor of the White Ribbon Review. Organization plans and methods will be discussed by Miss Maud Aldrich and Mrs. Elva White, vice-president and secretary, respectively, of the Oregon WCTU. Mrs. Wm. I. Hargis, state treasurer, will present the work of her department.

An evening meeting will be held on Tuesday, beginning at 7:30, with a song service and the showing of the film reel, "Smoking's Something to Think About," which has recently been produced by leading film producers at the request of the National WCTU. Following the showing of the pictures, an address will be given by Mrs. Toose.

In connection with the evening meeting on Tuesday, a gold medal speech contest is being arranged, the contestants to be well known Roseburg folk who have previously won silver medals. Mrs.

Fred Southwick is state speech director.

Special musical numbers contributed by Roseburg talent will be given at each session. Small Homes Building Scheduled for Boost

Building materials were used principally for residences.

Other government officials have stated that most materials and building labor are going into factory and commercial construction.

They suggested the priority plan might apply only to low and moderately priced houses—perhaps those costing less than \$8,000, the wartime ceiling. Other types of construction would get what was left over.

PORTLAND, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Building costs will drop "when workmen get to the point that they are happy to get back to work, and when enough service-men return to offer high competition to former wartime wage earners," the Oregon Savings and Loan League declared here.

Holding its annual convention, the group reported a house which cost \$5,000 in 1940 now costs \$6,375—a third more.

Members went on record as opposing the Senate Wagner-Elderly housing bill which, they said, implies transfer of loan association functions to a single authority mainly interested in public housing.

was rejected by the CIO United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America. The union had asked a flat 25 cents an hour increase.

Elsewhere along the nation's labor front, with the total idle because of disputes remaining at around 400,000, steps were taken to end two long walkouts.

May Seize Bus Line

In Chicago, E. W. Callahan, president of the executive joint council of the AFL, Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Union, said there was a possibility the government might take over operation of Greyhound Bus lines in 17 Eastern and Midwest states where a strike has disrupted service for nearly six weeks.

In Washington, Sen. Gurney (R-S. D.) said that the Conciliation Service had arranged a meeting next Tuesday of union officials and operators to discuss the Midwest truck strike that has tied up 160 trucking firms in seven states.

Earlier, Gurney and other senators from North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas and Iowa—states involved in the walkout—had asked President Truman to intercede and appoint a fact-finding board to investigate the wage dispute. The strike started Nov. 15 and the number of over-the-road truck drivers involved were estimated from 5,000 to 50,000.

Phone Strikers Win Hike

Granting of wage increases totaling about \$5,000,000 annually to nearly 19,000 local and long-distance telephone workers in the New York area ended a strike threat. Independent union company spokesmen said the agreement granted virtually all union demands. The pay boosts range from \$3 to \$5 weekly. Companies involved are the New York Telephone Company and the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Traffic Fine Levied
A traffic fine of \$10 was levied on Robert N. De Chambeau for failure to have a P.U.C. permit. Peace Justice Thomas Hartfield reported today.

Commissioners Return From Land Grant Meet

County Commissioners H. B. Roadman and J. Ross Hutchinson returned from Portland last night, after attending the meeting of the Oregon and California land grant counties, called by U. S. Senator Guy Cordon.

Judge D. N. Busenbark will return early next week. Roadman said, and declined to comment on the meeting.

Roadman and Hutchinson said that they never had seen so vividly the effects of a storm as between here and Portland, while on their trip. Buildings and trees and poles and overhead wires had been blown down all along the route. Roadman remembers especially a building near Eugene which was almost demolished as a result of last week's storm.

Oregon's E Bond Sales Pass \$15 Million Mark

PORTLAND, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Oregon's E bond total slowly climbed today to \$15,400,000, 68.8 per cent of the \$22,500,000 goal.

All sales to individuals reached \$52,980,000, 134.1 per cent of quota.

Norbury had left his home Thursday morning and at 6:30 yesterday evening the state police were called by his son, Harry Norbury, to search for the missing man. The body was found by state police about 400 yards back of the home.

to be told where to go and when, and could deduce that the Japanese communications were tapped.

This "whispering" about how Yamamoto was caught was the most "dangerous" of all, Marshall indicated. He got so concerned he asked FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover to trail some Army officers "so we could make an example of them."

Hoover was "hesitant," Marshall said, contending it would make a "Gestapo" out of his force. So it wasn't done.

Marshall related how one of a group of 25 code-crackers working at an Army station at Fort Washington, Va., was caught trying to "sell" the secret in Boston. The general didn't say what happened to that individual.
