## Hundreds Given Examination Here By X-Ray Device

Six hundred persons are to be examined today and tomorrow by the Chest X-Ray Survey unit at its stand by the Presbyterian Church, Lane and Jackson streets. The mobile unit is sponsored by the Oregon Tuberculosis Association and the County Public Health Association.

Shortly after 11 this morning, 77 persons have been examined. C. E. Bradford, manager of the unit, said, "One group going through included school children from Glendale. Other organized groups from industrial plants, civic organizations, and schools have been scheduled for examinations."

Pictures are developed on the truck, Bradford said, then are sent to Portland where they are diagnosed by physicians, who send their suggestions for treatment by mail to those whose pictures show an indication of T. ## New Charges Hit Pair Held for \$111,000 Robbery

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Two new indictments, charging theft of government ammunition and pistols here and of transporting thousands of dollars worth of furs from Portland, Ore., brought today against two men awaiting sentence for a \$111,300 bank messenger robbery.

The defendants are Stanley S. Matyssek, 23, of Niagara Falls, N. Y., convicted three days ago of armed robbery, kidnapping and conspiracy to rob the messengers, and John J. Uckele, 26, of Camden, N. J., who pleaded guilty last week to armed kidnapping.

Both pleaded innocent in U. S. district court yesterday to the new indictments. Only \$2,300 of the bank messenger robbery loot has been recovered. The remainder is believed to be hidden somewhere near here.

## British Decide to Keep Java Under Dutch Rule

BATAVIA, Java, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Highest authorities said today the British had decided to bring whatever additional forces might be needed into Java to restore order and reestablish Dutch sovereignty in the Netherlands East Indies.

The decision, which would end the British policy of dealing with Indonesian independence leaders in an effort to work out a compromise, was said to have been reached at conferences between Admiral Mountbatten and British, French and Dutch commanders.

A fully informed source said the new plan called for use of a large number of Dutch troops as well as British reinforcements. The Dutch, this source said, would hold various objectives after they were taken by the British.
